A READING OF THE WORD

FIRST READING: Acts 16:16-34

After Lydia's welcome and conversion in verses 11-15, Paul, Silas, and the author of Luke-Acts (and perhaps others) were on their way to "the place for prayer." It is not clear where this is—perhaps the same place where they met Lydia by the riverbank. While on their way, they met an enslaved young woman, who was being forced to tell fortunes to make a prophet for those who controlled her, because she was possessed by a spirit. She took notice of Paul and proclaimed that he and his companions were servants of the Most High God with a message of God's salvation. Paul was annoyed by her shouting and rebuked the spirit within her—it left her at that moment. The people enslaving and controlling the woman had Paul and Silas thrown into prison because of the disturbance they had caused. Paul and Silas were beaten and thrown into the innermost cell of the prison, their feet chained up. However, Paul and Silas prayed and sang hymns, and around midnight an earthquake occurred, shaking the foundation of the prison and all the gates opened and chains came loose. The jailer, upon awakening, assumed everyone had escaped and was going to kill himself, but Paul stopped him, because no one had left. The jailer believed that God had done this, and asked Paul and Silas what he must do to be saved. The jailer and his household were then all baptized. They took care of Paul and Silas and fed them, for everyone had come to believe in God.

16 16 Once when we were going to prayer, we met an enslaved young woman who was possessed with a spirit of divination and brought those who enslaved her a great deal of money by fortune-telling. 17 She began to follow Paul and the rest of us, shouting, "These are faithful followers of the Most High God, who proclaim to you the way of salvation!" 18 She did this for many days.

Finally one day Paul lost his temper, and turned around and said to the spirit, "In the name of Jesus Christ I command you to leave this woman!" It left her that moment.

19 But when those who enslaved her saw that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them before the authorities in the public square. 20 They brought them to the chief magistrates and said, "These people are Jews and are disturbing the peace 21 by advocating practices which are unlawful for us Romans to accept or practice."

22 The crowd joined in the attack on them, and the magistrates stripped them and ordered them to be flogged. 23 They were whipped many times and thrown into prison, and the jailer was told to keep a close watch on them. 24 So, following these instructions, the warden threw them into the innermost cell of the prison and chained their feet to a stake.

25 About midnight, Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God as the other prisoners listened. 26 Suddenly a severe earthquake shook the place, rocking the prison to its foundation. Immediately all the doors flew open, and everyone's chains were pulled loose. 27 When the jailer woke up and found the doors wide open, he drew a sword and was about to commit suicide, presuming that the prisoners had escaped.

28 But Paul shouted, "Don't harm yourself! We're all still here."

- 29 The jailer called for a light, then rushed in and fell trembling at the feet of Paul and Silas, and, 30 after a brief interval, led them out and asked them, "What must I do to be saved?"
- 31 They answered, "Believe in Jesus the Savior, and you will be saved—you and everyone in your household."
- 32 They proceeded to preach the word of God to the jailer and his whole household. 33 At that late hour of the night he took them in and bathed their wounds; then he and the whole household were baptized. 34 He led them up into his house, spread a table before them, and the whole family joyfully celebrated their newfound faith in God.

A READING FROM THE PSALMS: Psalm 97 (Responsively)

Psalm 97 is a song of praise to God as the ruler of all, the one of power and might. Similar to descriptions of other gods in ancient times, God's power is witnessed in the might of thunder, lightning, and fire—symbols of judgment. However, those who worship images are put to shame, for God is not an idol, God is the One God above all other gods. God delivers those who are faithful from those who are wicked, and those who are righteous worship God.

97 1 God reigns! Let the earth rejoice; let the many coastlands be glad!

2 Clouds and thick darkness surround you, God; righteousness and justice are the foundation of your judgment seat. 3 Fire goes before you and destroys your enemies on every side. 4 Your lightning bolts light up the world; the earth sees and trembles. 5 The mountains melt like wax at your sight, at the sight of the God of all the earth. 6 The heavens proclaim your justice, and all the peoples see your glory. 7 All who worship images are put to shame, who make their boast in worthless idols; all gods bow down before you. 8 Zion hears and is glad, and the women of Judah rejoice because of your judgments, God.

9 For you, God, are Most High over all the earth; you are exalted far above all gods.

10 God, you love those who hate evil; preserve the lives of your faithful ones and deliver them from the hands of those who are wicked. 11 Light dawns for those who are just, and joy for those who are upright in heart. 12 Rejoice in God, you who are just, and give praise to God's holy Name!

SECOND READING – Revelation 22:12-14, 16-17, 20-21

The Epistle (Christian Letter) readings in Easter have followed Revelation, and conclude with these verses in Revelation 22. The final vision is the completion of everything. The Spirit and the Betrothed (the church) invite all to join in the vision of God, and take the water of life for all who are thirsty. The beginning and the end, the bright morning star—Jesus invites us into this vision of eternity, and that it may come soon,

22 12 "Remember, I am coming soon! I bring with me the reward that will be given to all people according to their conduct. 13 I am the Alpha and the Omega, the First and the Last, the Beginning and the End. 14 Happy are they who wash their robes so as to have free access to the tree of life and enter the city through its gates.

16 "It is I, Jesus, who has sent my angel to give you this testimony about the churches. I am the Root and Offspring of David, the Morning Star shining bright." 17 The Spirit and the Betrothed say, "Come!"

Let the one who hears it answer, "Come!"

Let the thirsty come forward. Let all who desire it accept the gift of life-giving water.

20 The One who gives this testimony says, "Yes, I am coming soon!" Amen! Come, Jesus!

21 The grace of our Savior Jesus Christ be with you all. Amen.

GOSPEL READING - John 17:20-26

Jesus's final prayer with the disciples is found in these verses of John 17. Jesus prays not just for the disciples, but for all those who will believe through the words of the disciples, that all may become one. That the world may come to believe, as Jesus and God Above are one, so may we all be one. The world does not know Jesus, but will know Jesus through the disciples, and through us, by the love of God that we share with one another.

17 20 I don't pray for them alone. I pray also for those

who will believe in me through their message, 21 that all may be one, as you, Abba, are in me and I in you; I pray that they may be one in us, so that the world may believe that you sent me. 22 Ihave given them the glory you gave me that they may be one, as we are one— 23 I in them, you in me that they may be made perfect in unity. Then the world will know that you sent me, and that you loved them as you loved me. 24 Abba, I ask that those you gave me may be here with me, so they can see this glory of mine which is your gift to me, because of the love you had for me before the foundation of the world. 25 Righteous One, the world hasn't known you, but I have; and these people know that you sent me. 26 To them I have revealed your Name, and I will continue to reveal it so that the love you have for me may live in them, just as I may live in them."

Eastertide –Festival Season in the liturgical calendar of Christianity, celebrating the Resurrection of Jesus Christ – and our new resurrected life in the realm of God. It begins on Easter Sunday, which initiates Easter Week in Western Christianity, and Bright Week in Eastern Christianity. Traditionally lasting 40 days to commemorate the time the resurrected Jesus remained on earth before departing (the period between Easter Day and the Ascension), 20th century liturgical revision has led some western churches to expand Eastertide to 50 days to conclude on Pentecost.

PENTECOST – NEXT SUNDAY, JUNE 5, 2022

The Christian holiday of Pentecost is celebrated on the 50th day from Easter Sunday. It commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and other followers of Jesus Christ while they were in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of Weeks, as described in the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 2:1–31).

Pentecost is one of the Great feasts in the Eastern Orthodox Church, a Solemnity in the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church, a Festival in the Lutheran Churches and the United Church of Christ, and a Principal Feast in the Anglican Communion. Many Christian denominations provide a special liturgy for this holy celebration.

The term Pentecost comes from the Greek Πεντηκοστή (Pentēkostē) meaning "fiftieth". It refers to the Jewish harvest festival of Shavuot celebrated on the fiftieth day after Passover. It is also known as the "Feast of Weeks" and the "Feast of 50 days" in rabbinic tradition.

The events of Acts Chapter 2 are set against the backdrop of the celebration of Pentecost in Jerusalem. The author begins by noting that the disciples of Jesus "were all together in one place" on the "day of Pentecost" (ἡμέρα τῆς Πεντηκοστῆς).[Acts 2:1] The verb used in Acts 2:1 to indicate the arrival of the day of Pentecost carries a connotation of fulfillment.

There is a "mighty rushing wind" (wind is a common symbol for the Holy Spirit)[24][25] and "tongues as of fire" appear.[Acts 2:3] The gathered disciples were "filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance".[Acts 2:4] Some scholars have interpreted the passage as a reference to the multitude of languages spoken by the gathered disciples, [Acts 2:6–11] while others have taken the reference to "tongues" ($\gamma\lambda\tilde{\omega}\sigma\sigma\alpha\iota$) to signify ecstatic speech [1 Corinthians 14]. In Christian tradition, this event represents fulfillment of the promise that Christ will baptize his followers with the Holy Spirit [Acts 1:5; John 14:16–17].

The main sign of Pentecost in the West is the color red. It symbolizes joy and the fire of the Holy Spirit. Clergy and choirs wear red vestments, and in modern times, the custom has extended to the lay people of the congregation wearing red clothing in celebration as well. Red banners are often hung from walls or ceilings to symbolize the blowing of the "mighty wind" and the free movement of the Spirit. Other congregations have incorporated the use of red balloons, signifying the "Birthday of the Church". These may be held by the congregants, decorate the sanctuary, or released all at once.



MEMORIAL DAY – MONDAY, MAY 30, 2022

On Monday May 30, Americans will observe the federal holiday of Memorial Day. It's a day to honor our military personnel, and to remember those who died while serving in the armed forces. It is observed on the last Monday of May. It was formerly observed on May 30 from 1868 to 1970.

At its best, Memorial Day is an important opportunity for memory and mourning. We dare not forget the tragic costs and consequences of war.

Some people visit cemeteries and memorials on Memorial Day to honor and mourn those who died while serving in the U.S. military. Many volunteers place an American flag on graves of military personnel in national cemeteries. Memorial Day is also considered the unofficial beginning of summer in the United States.

Many cities and people have claimed to have first celebrated the event. In 1868, General John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic called for a "Decoration Day", which was widely celebrated. By 1890, every Northern state had adopted it as a holiday. The World Wars turned it into a generalized day of remembrance instead of just for the Civil War. In 1971, Congress standardized the holiday as "Memorial Day" and changed its observance to the last Monday in May.

Two other days celebrate those who have served or are serving in the U.S. military: **Armed Forces Day** (which is earlier in May), an unofficial U.S. holiday for honoring those currently serving in the armed forces, and **Veterans Day** (on November 11), which honors those who have served in the United States Armed Forces.

15 people, including 11 children were injured - four of those children were transferred to other hospitals in San Antonio and seven were discharged - out of the four adults who were treated, one was transferred and three were discharged.

IS THERE NO WAY BEYOND THIS?

I love the Church. I am so proud of the work of our congregations. The span of our gifts is breathtaking. I often catch myself fantasizing about what we could do if we found a way to weave our gifts together. There are moments, however, when our unwillingness to collaborate makes the challenges of the world even more gut-wrenching. Just when the world needs the Church the most, the polarization of America's partisan politics paralyzes us.

At least 21 people were murdered by a teenager this Tuesday in Uvalde, Texas, and at least 19 were children. This was barely 10 days after a racist massacre that left 10 dead in Buffalo, New York.

Last night, I held my daughter extra close as I tried to help her fall asleep. She asked me what was wrong, and all I could say was, "I'm so proud of you. You're growing up so fast." Next week she will graduate from kindergarten, but my mind was filled with the image of the dead bodies of elementary school children.

I find myself praying Psalm 13, "How long, Oh Lord?"

When I was in school we had fire drills and tornado drills. In the early 50s, schools across the US were training students to "duck and cover" in case of an atomic attack. Today's children, beginning as early as pre-school, have active shooter or intruder drills. Our children learn to hide quietly in classroom closets and barricade doors. Their teachers seek ways to keep anxiety at bay, but that's no easy task. Research underlines what should otherwise be obvious, that active shooter drills are

associated with increased depression, anxiety, and physiological health problems. When lawmakers cannot reach resolutions regarding gun-safety policies, we place the burden of school safety on our children. Is there no way beyond this? Is it really true, that in America we value our guns more than the lives of our children?

In our grief and anguish, we bear a pain which reveals the truth of the way the world is. Time and time again, we say, "never again," and yet these shootings become more common and more expected. The number of active shooter incidents in schools continues to rise. According to the Center for Homeland Defense and Security, since 1970, when current records began, "there have been 2,052 school shooting incidents in America which have left 661 dead." The shooting in Texas was one of the deadliest shootings in U.S. history. We risk becoming numb to the senseless loss of life.

Fantasizing about what the Church can be in a moment like this feels disingenuous. Is paralysis all we have left?

Today, even with the psalms on my lips, I find it hard to pray in the name of Jesus without thinking about the bodies of our nation's crucified children.

I love the Church. I am proud of the work we continue to do.

Can we weave our gifts together in ways that bring healing in the midst of such tragedy?

Whatever our response is, we cannot become numb to it.

A PRAYER

From the national officers of the United Church of Christ after the school shooting in Uvalde, Texas, May 24, 2022

In utter and irrepressible grief we offer these words, giving collective voice to the anguish we all feel.

God, hear our prayer:

For the nineteen children now dead;

For the two teachers now dead;

For the parents, family, and friends who will spend the rest of their lives aching every night from the weight of this;

For a schoolhouse rendered trauma-laden and grief-stricken in a matter of minutes, whose students will suffer PTSD in the wake of this tragedy;

For the caregivers in Uvalde now burdened with the task of managing the shared and collective grief of a traumatized community who love their children;

For those who feel the new burden of useless guilt in the aftermath of this, wondering what else they could have done to prevent this;

For the nation, so in love with our weapons that we continue to tolerate these mass shootings and the grief they inflict without ever building the collective will needed to address it fully;

For the world, suffering a massive and collective grief of its own and witnessing acts of cruelty daily too numerous to fully process.

Heal our gaping wounds.

Restore our sense of compassion.

Quiet the restlessness within us.

Settle the building righteous anger.

Quicken the desire for peace.

Remove the chasm that sees race and religion and political persuasion as the marks of a person's worth and value.

End the cycle of violence that begets more violence.

Silence the voices that broker in fear and division and create the hatred we see mounting everywhere between us.

Quiet the troubled soul thinking of grabbing the next gun and ending innocent lives.

Empower us all to act now, refusing to wait for the next horror show before we change the laws that

make guns and their discharge so accessible.

Turn anguish to action; our rage to restoration; our hatred to love; our grief to hope.

Let it never happen again. Ever. How much more can we bear, O Lord? How much more can we endure.

Be our rock of refuge.

Be our light of inspiration.

Be our beacon of hope.

Be the arms of love that hold us until the pain recedes.

Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayers.

Amen.
