A READING OF THE WORD

FIRST READING: Ecclesiastes 1:2, 12-14, 2:18-23

Though the authorship of the book has been attributed to Solomon, most scholars believe this is a collection of sayings and instructions compiled and shared by a Teacher who uses Solomon's name for clout, for his reputation as a wise king. The writer of Ecclesiastes sees that everything human beings pursue in this lifetime is usually meaningless, like chasing the wind, or a mist that slips through our fingers. People work hard, either for money and possessions, or for wisdom and knowledge, and it all passes after they die. People take no time for rest, not even at night, thinking they must be productive. It is meaningless. It is chasing after things that do not matter and that we cannot grasp.

1 The Sayings of the Teacher, son of David ruler in Jerusalem:
2 "Completely illusory!" says the Teacher. "Completely illusory!
Everything is just an illusion!"

12 I, the Teacher, was ruler of Israel in Jerusalem. 13 I saw it as my duty—aided by Wisdom—to determine all that is accomplished under the sun. What a heavy task God has laid upon us! 14 So now I've seen all the works that have been done under the sun, and let me tell you: Everything is but a mist of air, like chasing the wind.

2 18 I have come to abhor all my labor under the sun, the fruits of which I now must pass on to my successor. 19 Will this person be wise or foolish? Regardless, my successor will be in charge of all mighty things I created under the sun. This too is illusory. 20 So I gave over my heart to utter despair over everything for which I had labored under the sun. 21 For I, a person who has worked wisely, skillfully, and successfully, must leave it to someone who has not so much as lifted a finger—another mist of air, another miscarriage of justice. 22 Why do I gain for all my sweat and struggle under the sun? 23 What about the daily struggles, the strain of official duties, the anxiety in the dead of night? This too is illusory.

A READING FROM THE PSALMS: Psalm 49:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 49 is a wisdom psalm. In the first half, verses 1-12, the psalmist speaks to all people of the world, of all economic backgrounds. Wealth can't save anyone, can't buy anyone out of the grave, and both foolish and wise people will die all the same. Though people buy and sell land and name places after them, none of it matters when they die, because the grave becomes their home.

49 1 Hear this, everyone!
Listen, all who live on the earth—
2 Both women and men,
rich and poor alike!
3 My mouth will speak wisdom,
and my heart will utter knowledge.
4 I'll sing you a riddle,
and with my harp I'll explain its meaning:

5 Why should I be afraid in times of danger, or when I'm surrounded by those who lie and deceive? 6 They trust only in their money, and boast of nothing but their great wealth. 7 Yet even they cannot redeem another person no one can pay God the ransom for someone else, 8 Because the payment for a life is too great. What they can pay will never be enough 9 To keep them from the grave, to let them live forever. 10 They see that even the wise die, as do the foolish and stupid. They all perish and leave their riches to others. 11 Their graves will be their homes forever; there they'll live from one generation to the next, even though they once had lands of their own. 12 Their prosperity cannot keep them from death; they'll die just like any animal.

SECOND READING- Colossians 3:1-11

The Epistle/Christian Letter reading continues in Colossians. The writer calls for unity in Christ, in behavior and in identity. The writer encourages the believers to set their minds on Christ. The true believer is clothed with a new self, one that lives by loving one another. In this renewal, all are a new creation in Christ. Their old identities were formed to be in rivalry with others, but their new identity in Christ is as a child of God, for Christ is in all.

3 1 Since you've been resurrected with Christ, set your heart on what pertains to higher realms, where Christ is seated at God's right hand. 2 Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things of earth. 3 After all, you died, and now your life is hidden with Christ in God. 4 But when Christ—who is your life—is revealed, you too will be revealed with Christ in glory.

5 So put to death everything in you that belongs to your old nature: promiscuity, impurity, guilty passion, evil desires and especially greed, which is the same thing as idolatry. 6 These are the sins which provoke God's wrath. 7 Your own conduct was once like this, when these things were your very life. 8 But now you must rid yourselves of them all: anger, rage, malice, slander and abusive language. 9 Stop lying to one another.

What you have done is put aside your old self with its past deeds 10 and put on a new self, one that grows in knowledge as it is formed anew in the image of its Creator. 11 And in that image, there is no Greek or Hebrew; no Jew or Gentile; no barbarian or Scythian; no enslaved or citizen. There is only Christ, who is all in all.

GOSPEL READING – Luke 12:13-21

Jesus told a parable after he was challenged by a person in the crowd. Someone asked Jesus to tell his brother to divide the family inheritance with him. Jesus responded with the word, "Friend," followed by a rhetorical question: who appointed Jesus to be judge between them? In response, Jesus told a parable of a wealthy farmer whose land produced more than needed, and even after their storage was full the farmer decided to tear down his barns to build bigger ones. The farmer was satisfied with this plan, telling his soul he'd done well, but that very night God demanded his life. For those who store up wealth for themselves have no wealth in God. The pursuit of wealth and power and notoriety in this world is meaningless and worthless. Excess in this world must be given to those without, not hoarded for one's self, for that is all one will remember. The person who originally wanted Jesus to tell his brother to divide the family inheritance was more concerned about wealth and power than about the relationship with his brother and the rest of his family. That is what he will always be known for.

 $12\,$ 13 Someone in the crowd said to Jesus, "Teacher, tell my brother to give me my share of our inheritance."

14 Jesus replied, "Friend, who has set me up as your judge or arbiter?" 15 Then he told the crowd, "Avoid greed in all its forms. Your life isn't made more secure by what you own—even when you have more than you need."

16 Jesus then told them a parable in these words: "There was a rich farmer who had a good harvest.

17 " 'What will I do?' the farmer mused. 'I have no place to store my harvest. 18 I know! I'll pull down my grain bins and build larger ones. All my grain and goods will go there. 19 Then I'll say to myself: You have blessings in reserve for many years to come. Relax! Eat, drink and be merry!'

20 "But God said to the farmer, 'You fool! This very night your life will be required of you. To whom will all your accumulated wealth go?'

21 "This is the way it works with people who accumulate riches for themselves, but are not rich toward God."

Season after Pentecost - Ordinary Time

The longest season of the liturgical calendar is filled with Sundays called "Ordinary Time." The season - called the Season after Pentecost or Ordinary Time - began with Trinity Sunday and ends with Reign of Christ Sunday (the Sunday before the start of Advent). If you're like me, you might hear "ordinary time" as "boring time." But that's not the case! The word "ordinary" most likely means "numbered" here (think ordinal numbers), because the Sundays of Ordinary Time are numbered. In this season we move from concentrating on the event of Christ in the world to focusing toward the impact of being in Christ in the world. A life in the unity of the Trinity is one of being shaped and sent daily in the image and in the purpose of Holy Love. The liturgical color for this season is green. During the Season after Pentecost, we focus on the life of the Church as it grows in the midst of the world.
