A READING OF THE WORD

FIRST READING: 2 Kings 5:1-15

The Hebrew Scripture reading is the story of foreigner Naaman and the Hebrew prophet Elisha in 2 Kings 5. Naaman was the commander of the king of Aram's army, but he suffered from leprosy. Naaman's wife had a servant, an Israelite young woman who was taken captive, and this servant told Naaman's wife about the prophet in Samaria (the capital of the northern kingdom of Israel), who could heal. The king of Aram wrote a letter to the king of Israel on behalf of Naaman, but the king of Israel freaked out, because he wasn't God. Elisha, God's prophet, told the king of Israel to calm down and to let Naaman come to him, because then he would know there was a prophet in Israel. Naaman arrived at Elisha's house, and Elisha's messenger told Naaman to go wash seven times in the Jordan

and he would be clean. Naaman was angry because it was too simple. It had to be more complicated than that, otherwise he could have just bathed at home. Naaman's servants reasoned with him: he would rather do something difficult, instead of a simple act for healing? Naaman gives in, bathes in the Jordan seven times, and his skin is restored. Naaman then realizes there is no God but God, the God of Israel.

1 Now Naaman was commander of the army of the ruler of Aram. He was a great officer and highly esteemed. It was at Naaman's hand that God gave a victory to Aram. He was a mighty warrior. And he had leprosy.

2 On one of their raids the Arameans captured a young woman who was an Israelite. She served Naaman's wife. 3 One day she said to her mistress, "If only Naaman would see the prophet who is in Samaria. He would cure Naaman's leprosy." 4 Naaman went to the ruler and told him what the Israelite woman said. 5 "By all means, go," the ruler replied. I will send a letter to the ruler of Israel." So Naaman left, taking ten talents of silver, six thousand shekels of gold and ten sets of clothing. 6 The letter that he took to the ruler of Israel read, "With this letter I am sending my attendant Naaman to you so that you may cure him of leprosy."

7 As soon as the ruler of Israel read the letter, he tore his robes, and said, "Am I God? Can I kill and bring back to life? Why does this fellow send someone to me to be cured of his leprosy? See how he is trying to pick a fight with me!" 8 When Elisha the prophet of God learned that the ruler of Israel tore his robes, he sent a message to the ruler, "Why did you tear your robes? Have Naaman come to me, and he will learn that there is a prophet in Israel." 9 So Naaman went with his horses and chariots and stopped at the door of Elisha's house. 10 Elisha sent a messenger to say to the warrior, "Go, wash yourself seven times in the Jordan, and your flesh will be restored, and you will be cleansed."

11 But Naaman went away angry, and said, "I thought that he would surely come out to me and stand there before me, calling on the name YHWH and wave his hand over the spot and cure me of my leprosy. 12 Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than any of the waters of Israel? Couldn't I wash in them and be cleansed?" So, he turned and went away in a rage. 13 Naaman's attendants went to him saying, "Sir, if the prophet had told you to do some great thing, would you not have done it? How much more, then, when he tells you, 'Wash and be cleansed?'" 14 So he went down and dipped himself in the Jordan seven times, as the prophet of God told him, and his flesh was restored and became clean like that of a youth. 15 Then Naaman and his retinue went back to the prophet of God. He stood before him, and said, "Now I know that there is no God in all the world except in Israel. Please accept a gift from a grateful person."

PSALM RESPONSE: Psalm 111 (Responsively)

Psalm 111 is a song of praise, reminding the congregation of all that God has done for them. God provides for those who are faithful, and God keeps the covenant with the people. Everything God does is faithful, just, and true. The beginning of wisdom, the psalmist writes, is the fear, or awe, of God. God is far beyond what we can possibly imagine or understand, and those who are wise understand this, giving God all the glory, honor, and praise.

1 Alleluia!

I will thank you, God, with all my heart
in the meeting of the just and their assembly.

**2 Great are your works,
to be pondered by all who love them.**

3 Majestic and glorious are your works,
and your justice stands firm forever.

**4 You make us remember your wonders—
you are compassion and love.**

5 You give food to those who revere you,
keeping your Covenant ever in mind.

**6 You reveal to your people the power of your actions
by giving them the lands of the nations as their
inheritance.**

**10 Reverence for God is the beginning of wisdom—
and those who have it prove themselves wise.

SECOND READING: 2 Timothy 2:8-15

Paul writes in these verses of 2 Timothy 2 to urge Timothy not to forget the reason that Paul is suffering in prison is because of the Gospel. Jesus Christ was raised from the dead, and the resurrection cannot be contained, just like the word of God cannot be contained, either. Paul is enduring imprisonment because God cannot be imprisoned. Paul is in solidarity with Christ because Christ has been in solidarity with us, and even when we are faithless, Christ remains faithful. Paul urges Timothy to make an effort to speak plainly and faithfully and not get caught up when others want to debate words.

8 Remember that Jesus Christ, a descendent of David, was raised from the dead. This is the Gospel I preach; 9 in preaching it I suffer as a criminal—even to the point of being thrown into chains—but there is no chaining the word of God! 10 Therefore I bear with all of this for the sake of those whom God has chosen, in order that they may obtain salvation in Christ Jesus, and with it, eternal glory.

11 You can depend on this:

If we have died with Christ,
we will also live with Christ;

12 if we hold out to the end,
we will also reign with Christ.

If we deny Christ,
Christ will deny us.
13 If we are unfaithful,
Christ will remain faithful,
for Christ can never be unfaithful.

14 Keep reminding people of these things. Warn them before God against quarrelling about words, which is of no value and only ruins those who listen. 15 Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who doesn't need to be ashamed and who correctly handles the word of truth.

GOSPEL READING: Luke 17:11-19

The Gospel reading tells of when Jesus and the disciples passed between Samaria and Galilee. A group of ten people with leprosy called out to Jesus. People with leprosy were cut off from the rest of society as they were seen as unclean and might possibly be contagious. Jesus calls back to them to go show themselves to the priests. As they went on their way, the people realized they were made clean. One came back to Jesus, praising God, and fell at Jesus's feet to thank him. That one was a Samaritan, and he was the only one who came back to praise God. Jesus told Samaritan that his faith had made him well. This is the second time in Luke (the first is the Parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10) that Jesus uses a Samaritan, an outsider and foreigner, as an example of faithfulness from someone that the reader/listener would not expect.

11 On the journey to Jerusalem, Jesus passed along the borders of Samaria and Galilee.
12 As Jesus was entering a village, ten people with leprosy met him. Keeping their distance,
13 they raised their voices and said, "Jesus, Rabbi, have pity on us!"

14 When Jesus saw them, he responded, "Go and show yourselves to the priests."

As they were going, they were healed. 15 One of them, realizing what had happened, came back praising God in a loud voice, 16 then fell down at the feet of Jesus and spoke his praises. The individual was a Samaritan.

17 Jesus replied, "Weren't all ten made whole? Where are the other nine? 18 Was there no one to return and give thanks except this foreigner?" 19 Then Jesus said to the Samaritan, "Stand up and go your way; your faith has saved you."

Season after Pentecost - Ordinary Time

The longest season of the liturgical calendar is filled with Sundays called "Ordinary Time." **The season - called the Season after Pentecost or Ordinary Time - began with Trinity Sunday and ends with Reign of Christ Sunday (the Sunday before the start of Advent).** If you're like me, you might hear "ordinary time" as "boring time." But that's not the case! The word "ordinary" most likely means "numbered" here (think ordinal numbers), because the Sundays of Ordinary Time are numbered. **In this season we move from concentrating on the event of Christ in the world to focusing toward the impact of being in Christ in the world. A life in the unity of the Trinity is one of being shaped and sent daily in the image and in the purpose of Holy Love.** The liturgical color for this season is green. During the Season after Pentecost, we focus on the life of the Church as it grows in the midst of the world.

Pakistan's 'dire' flood crisis is subject of UCC emergency appeal

The United Church of Christ has issued an emergency appeal for relief-and-recovery gifts in response to what it called "massive flooding" across most of Pakistan.

Wider Church Ministries launched the **UCC Pakistan Response Fund** Sept. 16.

Torrential monsoons since June have dumped nearly five times as much rain as the country usually gets. So far, the resulting floods have:

- Killed more than 1,400 people
- Affected 30 million people and displaced 800,000
- Damaged or destroyed 1 million homes, as well as farms, livestock, roads, bridges, schools and more.

One-third of country still submerged

"The situation in Pakistan remains dire as more than a third of the country is still under water," said the Rev. Josh Baird, who heads the UCC's Global H.O.P.E. team. "The most pressing needs are for food, clean water and sanitation, and emergency housing.

"In areas where the water has not receded, people are forced to construct temporary shelter on whatever dry patch of land they can access — often on the edge of roads."

"At its peak, 73 percent of Pakistan's districts were impacted by flooding," the appeal's web page says. "... More than half of its districts have been declared 'calamity hit' by the government — a number that is expected to rise as the rain continues and floods flow through the Punjab and Sindh provinces."

World's churches respond together

United Nations Secretary-General António Guterres has called the crisis an "unprecedented natural disaster" caused by "the intensification of climate change." "No country deserves this fate, but particularly not countries like Pakistan that have done almost nothing to contribute to global warming," he said. He called on the international community for "massive financial support," especially from "countries that have contributed more to climate change."

Baird said the UCC is working with ecumenical partners to respond. Community World Service Asia, a partner through the ACT Alliance, is meeting immediate needs "while laying the groundwork for long-term recovery," he said. "Gifts to the Pakistan Appeal will support emergency relief and focus on providing long-term care through the gifting of items such as seed for fields and feed and vaccines for livestock.

"With more than 6.4 million people projected to require humanitarian assistance, we anticipate walking with affected communities for the restoration of homes and livelihoods for many years."

Hurricanes 2022 Emergency Appeal

The United Church of Christ is issuing an appeal to support immediate needs for families and communities affected by Hurricanes Fiona and Ian.

While this year's hurricane season started slow, the last two weeks have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. More than a week and a half after Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, hundreds of thousands of people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Rev. Edward Rivera-Santiago, Pastor General of Iglesia Evangélica Unida de Puerto Rico shared that congregations across the island are reporting both church and community members whose homes are severely damaged, with some facing total loss. Solidarity grants from Global H.O.P.E. and Global Ministries have been sent to assist with immediate needs while basic infrastructure is repaired and more complete assessments can be made.

Meanwhile, Hurricane Ian still rages, with widespread damage in Cuba, flooding and wind damage across Florida, and coastal flooding threatening Georgia and the Carolinas. It is way too early to know the full extent of damage in Cuba and in Florida, yet early indications point to a recovery that will take many years – perhaps a decade.

Emergency response personnel are active. Relief agencies are meeting immediate needs where they can gain access to communities hard hit by the storm. United Church of Christ partners through National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster who focus on relief are implementing their plans. Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners. Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.
