A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

122 1 How I rejoiced when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of God!"2 And now our feet are standing within your gates, Jerusalem.

3 Jerusalem restored!
The city, one united whole!
4 Here the tribes ascend,
the tribes of God.
They come to praise God's Name,
as God commanded Israel—

5 Here, where the tribunals of justice are, the judgment seats of David's house.

6 Pray for peace within Jerusalem: "May those who love you prosper!

7 May peace be in your walls! May your citadels be always secure!" 8 For the sake of my family and friends, I say, "Peace be within you!"
9 For the sake of the Sovereign our God, I will seek your good.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

*Advent Wreath Prayer and Blessing

O God our God, we praise you for your Child, Jesus Christ. who is Emmanuel, the hope of all peoples; who is the wisdom that teaches and guides us; who is the Savior of every nation.

O God, let your blessing come upon our community gathered here before you. Bless us (+) and our advent wreath (+)

May the light that shines forth from it illumine our way as we journey towards Christmas; may the light that shines forth from it illumine our lives as we wait in hope for the birth of the Christ-child. We ask this through Christ who is the Light of the World. Amen.

*Advent Candle Lighting Liturgy - First Sunday of Advent, Year A: November 27, 2022, Up to Restoration (Isaiah 2:1-5, Psalm 122)

Reader One: "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" (*Psalm 122:1*).

Reader Two: We are glad. Whether we drove in or climbed up, whether we logged on or tuned in. We are glad to be here in this community, with this family. It is a place of joyful hope, of radical welcome. It is a place where, together, we can wait in wondrous anticipation of the kin-dom to come.

Reader One: "Many people will come and say: 'Come, let us climb God's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, Rachel, and Leah, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction will be given from Zion and the word of God from Jerusalem." (Isaiah 2:3)

Reader Two: We light this candle as a sign of our hope, our joyous hope that we can be restored—our faith restored,our strength restored, our confidence restored, our joy restored as we watch and wait with all God's people for the promise to be fulfilled.

Light the first candle on the Advent wreath.

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

We're invited to participate in a Holiday Food Drive for neighbors in need in the Tremont, Duck Island, and Irishtown Bend neighborhoods. The food drive is an annual campaign sponsored by Tremont West Development Corp involving residents, businesses, and churches in these neighborhoods. Nine local block clubs are also participating this year: Auburn-Lincoln Park, Central Tremont, Duck Island, Holmden-Buhrer-Rowley/Mentor-Castle-Clark, Irishtown Bend, Metro North, South of Jefferson and North of Literary — as well as Tremont West staff.

This year's food drive will support the fine work of these Hunger Ministries/Food Pantries: St. Augustine Hunger Center hot meals program, St. Augustine Parish food pantry ministry, Pilgrim Congregational UCC food pantry, Immanuel Lutheran food pantry, Westside Catholic Center, St. Malachi Parish Back Door Ministry, Iglesia Nueva Vida food pantry, Mega Church Resource Center food pantry, Scranton Road Bible Church, Hunger Action Network, and Greater Cleveland Food Bank.



Here's How to Donate and the Guidelines for this Season's Holiday Food Drive:

- Items Needed: Canned goods, nonperishable boxed food items, paper products (toilet paper, paper towels, napkins)
- Cash/Checks: You may also donate by cash/check if you prefer. Checks must be made out to the food pantry or pantries of your choice for verification purposes, checks must first be mailed to the Tremont West offices (Re: Food Drive, 2406 Professor, Cleveland, OH 44113) who will deliver them to the respective food pantries.
- **Donate online:** givebutter.com/HolidayFoodDrive How to give: Click donate, select an amount to give, choose your block club (Holmden-Buhrer-Rowley/Men-

tor-Castle-Clark), choose which food pantry you want your donation to be sent to, and watch the food drive unfold! Donations may be made by Credit Card, Paypal, or Venmo.

- Drop-off point for canned goods: Tremont West Development Corp offices' side porches (2406 Professor).
- Deadlines: For delivery before the holidays, items must be turned in by Friday, December 16th. A second delivery will be made in mid-January, 2023 for items donated after the 16th. (NOTE: The Tremont West offices are closed December 23rd January 1st and will reopen on Monday, January 2nd, 2022). Deliveries during that time can only be made to Zion Church and not to the Tremont West office.
- Most important of all is the goal: lending a helping hand to neighbors families and children in need in Tremont/Duck Island/Irishtown Bend and providing help to support the outstanding work of ten local food pantries-ministries St. Augustine Hunger Center hot meals program, St. Augustine Parish food pantry ministry, Pilgrim Congregational UCC food pantry, Scranton Road Bible Church, Immanuel Lutheran food pantry, Westside Catholic Center, St. Malachi Parish Back Door Ministry, Iglesia Nueva Vida food pantry, Mega Church Resource Center food pantry, and Greater Cleveland Food Bank, who get nutritious food to children and families all year long!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, some people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Hurricane Ian raged, with widespread damage in Cuba, flooding and wind damage, storm surge and in-land flooding across Florida, and flooding threatening Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia.

Emergency response personnel are active. Relief agencies are meeting immediate needs where they can gain access to communities hard hit by the storm. United Church of Christ partners through National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster who focus on relief are implementing their plans. Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

122 1 How I rejoiced when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of God!"2 And now our feet are standing within your gates, Jerusalem.

3 Jerusalem restored!
The city, one united whole!
4 Here the tribes ascend,
the tribes of God.
They come to praise God's Name,
as God commanded Israel—

5 Here, where the tribunals of justice are, the judgment seats of David's house.

6 Pray for peace within Jerusalem: "May those who love you prosper!

7 May peace be in your walls! May your citadels be always secure!" 8 For the sake of my family and friends, I say, "Peace be within you!"
9 For the sake of the Sovereign our God, I will seek your good.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

Reader One: "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" (*Psalm 122:1*).

Reader Two: We are glad. Whether we drove in or climbed up, whether we logged on or tuned in. We are glad to be here in this community, with this family. It is a place of joyful hope, of radical welcome. It is a place where, together, we can wait in wondrous anticipation of the kin-dom to come.

Reader One: "Many people will come and say: 'Come, let us climb God's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, Rachel, and Leah, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction will be given from Zion and the word of God from Jerusalem." (Isaiah 2:3)

Reader Two: We light this candle as a sign of our hope, our joyous hope that we can be restored—our faith restored,our strength restored, our confidence restored, our joy restored as we watch and wait with all God's people for the promise to be fulfilled.

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, some people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Hurricane Ian raged, with widespread damage in Cuba, flooding and wind damage, storm surge and in-land flooding across Florida, and flooding threatening Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia.

Emergency response personnel are active. Relief agencies are meeting immediate needs where they can gain access to communities hard hit by the storm. United Church of Christ partners through National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster who focus on relief are implementing their plans. Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

122 1 How I rejoiced when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of God!"2 And now our feet are standing within your gates, Jerusalem.

3 Jerusalem restored!
The city, one united whole!
4 Here the tribes ascend,
the tribes of God.
They come to praise God's Name,
as God commanded Israel—

5 Here, where the tribunals of justice are, the judgment seats of David's house.

6 Pray for peace within Jerusalem: "May those who love you prosper!

7 May peace be in your walls! May your citadels be always secure!" 8 For the sake of my family and friends, I say, "Peace be within you!"
9 For the sake of the Sovereign our God, I will seek your good.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

May the light that shines forth from it illumine our way as we journey towards Christmas; may the light that shines forth from it illumine our lives as we wait in hope for the birth of the Christ-child. We ask this through Christ who is the Light of the World. Amen.

Reader Two: We are glad. Whether we drove in or climbed up, whether we logged on or tuned in. We are glad to be here in this community, with this family. It is a place of joyful hope, of radical welcome. It is a place where, together, we can wait in wondrous anticipation of the kin-dom to come.

Reader One: "Many people will come and say: 'Come, let us climb God's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, Rachel, and Leah, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction will be given from Zion and the word of God from Jerusalem." (Isaiah 2:3)

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, some people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

122 1 How I rejoiced when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of God!"2 And now our feet are standing within your gates, Jerusalem.

3 Jerusalem restored!
The city, one united whole!
4 Here the tribes ascend,
the tribes of God.
They come to praise God's Name,
as God commanded Israel—

5 Here, where the tribunals of justice are, the judgment seats of David's house.

6 Pray for peace within Jerusalem: "May those who love you prosper!

7 May peace be in your walls! May your citadels be always secure!" 8 For the sake of my family and friends, I say, "Peace be within you!"
9 For the sake of the Sovereign our God, I will seek your good.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

*Advent Candle Lighting Liturgy - First Sunday of Advent, Year A: November 27, 2022, Up to Restoration (Isaiah 2:1-5, Psalm 122)

Reader One: "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" (*Psalm 122:1*).

Reader One: "Many people will come and say: 'Come, let us climb God's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, Rachel, and Leah, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction will be given from Zion and the word of God from Jerusalem." (Isaiah 2:3)

Reader Two: We light this candle as a sign of our hope, our joyous hope that we can be restored—our faith restored,our strength restored, our confidence restored, our joy restored as we watch and wait with all God's people for the promise to be fulfilled.

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, some people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Hurricane Ian raged, with widespread damage in Cuba, flooding and wind damage, storm surge and in-land flooding across Florida, and flooding threatening Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia.

Emergency response personnel are active. Relief agencies are meeting immediate needs where they can gain access to communities hard hit by the storm. United Church of Christ partners through National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster who focus on relief are implementing their plans. Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

122 1 How I rejoiced when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of God!"2 And now our feet are standing within your gates, Jerusalem.

3 Jerusalem restored!
The city, one united whole!
4 Here the tribes ascend,
the tribes of God.
They come to praise God's Name,
as God commanded Israel—

5 Here, where the tribunals of justice are, the judgment seats of David's house.

6 Pray for peace within Jerusalem: "May those who love you prosper!

7 May peace be in your walls! May your citadels be always secure!" 8 For the sake of my family and friends, I say, "Peace be within you!"
9 For the sake of the Sovereign our God, I will seek your good.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

O God our God, we praise you for your Child, Jesus Christ. who is Emmanuel, the hope of all peoples; who is the wisdom that teaches and guides us; who is the Savior of every nation.

O God, let your blessing come upon our community gathered here before you. Bless us (+) and our advent wreath (+)

May the light that shines forth from it illumine our way as we journey towards Christmas; may the light that shines forth from it illumine our lives as we wait in hope for the birth of the Christ-child. We ask this through Christ who is the Light of the World. Amen.

*Advent Candle Lighting Liturgy - First Sunday of Advent, Year A: November 27, 2022, Up to Restoration (Isaiah 2:1-5, Psalm 122)

Reader One: "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" (*Psalm 122:1*).

Reader Two: We are glad. Whether we drove in or climbed up, whether we logged on or tuned in. We are glad to be here in this community, with this family. It is a place of joyful hope, of radical welcome. It is a place where, together, we can wait in wondrous anticipation of the kin-dom to come.

Reader One: "Many people will come and say: 'Come, let us climb God's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, Rachel, and Leah, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction will be given from Zion and the word of God from Jerusalem." (Isaiah 2:3)

Reader Two: We light this candle as a sign of our hope, our joyous hope that we can be restored—our faith restored,our strength restored, our confidence restored, our joy restored as we watch and wait with all God's people for the promise to be fulfilled.

Light the first candle on the Advent wreath.

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, some people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Hurricane Ian raged, with widespread damage in Cuba, flooding and wind damage, storm surge and in-land flooding across Florida, and flooding threatening Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia.

Emergency response personnel are active. Relief agencies are meeting immediate needs where they can gain access to communities hard hit by the storm. United Church of Christ partners through National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster who focus on relief are implementing their plans. Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

122 1 How I rejoiced when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of God!"2 And now our feet are standing within your gates, Jerusalem.

3 Jerusalem restored!
The city, one united whole!
4 Here the tribes ascend,
the tribes of God.
They come to praise God's Name,
as God commanded Israel—

5 Here, where the tribunals of justice are, the judgment seats of David's house.

6 Pray for peace within Jerusalem: "May those who love you prosper!

7 May peace be in your walls! May your citadels be always secure!" 8 For the sake of my family and friends, I say, "Peace be within you!"
9 For the sake of the Sovereign our God, I will seek your good.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

Reader One: "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" (*Psalm 122:1*).

Reader Two: We are glad. Whether we drove in or climbed up, whether we logged on or tuned in. We are glad to be here in this community, with this family. It is a place of joyful hope, of radical welcome. It is a place where, together, we can wait in wondrous anticipation of the kin-dom to come.

Reader One: "Many people will come and say: 'Come, let us climb God's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, Rachel, and Leah, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction will be given from Zion and the word of God from Jerusalem." (Isaiah 2:3)

Reader Two: We light this candle as a sign of our hope, our joyous hope that we can be restored—our faith restored,our strength restored, our confidence restored, our joy restored as we watch and wait with all God's people for the promise to be fulfilled.

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, some people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Hurricane Ian raged, with widespread damage in Cuba, flooding and wind damage, storm surge and in-land flooding across Florida, and flooding threatening Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia.

Emergency response personnel are active. Relief agencies are meeting immediate needs where they can gain access to communities hard hit by the storm. United Church of Christ partners through National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster who focus on relief are implementing their plans. Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

122 1 How I rejoiced when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of God!"2 And now our feet are standing within your gates, Jerusalem.

3 Jerusalem restored!
The city, one united whole!
4 Here the tribes ascend,
the tribes of God.
They come to praise God's Name,
as God commanded Israel—

5 Here, where the tribunals of justice are, the judgment seats of David's house.

6 Pray for peace within Jerusalem: "May those who love you prosper!

7 May peace be in your walls! May your citadels be always secure!" 8 For the sake of my family and friends, I say, "Peace be within you!"
9 For the sake of the Sovereign our God, I will seek your good.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

May the light that shines forth from it illumine our way as we journey towards Christmas; may the light that shines forth from it illumine our lives as we wait in hope for the birth of the Christ-child. We ask this through Christ who is the Light of the World. Amen.

*Advent Candle Lighting Liturgy - First Sunday of Advent, Year A: November 27, 2022, Up to Restoration (Isaiah 2:1-5, Psalm 122)

Reader One: "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" (*Psalm 122:1*).

Reader Two: We are glad. Whether we drove in or climbed up, whether we logged on or tuned in. We are glad to be here in this community, with this family. It is a place of joyful hope, of radical welcome. It is a place where, together, we can wait in wondrous anticipation of the kin-dom to come.

Reader One: "Many people will come and say: 'Come, let us climb God's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, Rachel, and Leah, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction will be given from Zion and the word of God from Jerusalem." (Isaiah 2:3)

Reader Two: We light this candle as a sign of our hope, our joyous hope that we can be restored—our faith restored,our strength restored, our confidence restored, our joy restored as we watch and wait with all God's people for the promise to be fulfilled.

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, some people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

122 1 How I rejoiced when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of God!"2 And now our feet are standing within your gates, Jerusalem.

3 Jerusalem restored!
The city, one united whole!
4 Here the tribes ascend,
the tribes of God.
They come to praise God's Name,
as God commanded Israel—

5 Here, where the tribunals of justice are, the judgment seats of David's house.

6 Pray for peace within Jerusalem: "May those who love you prosper!

7 May peace be in your walls! May your citadels be always secure!" 8 For the sake of my family and friends, I say, "Peace be within you!"
9 For the sake of the Sovereign our God, I will seek your good.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

O God our God, we praise you for your Child, Jesus Christ. who is Emmanuel, the hope of all peoples; who is the wisdom that teaches and guides us; who is the Savior of every nation.

O God, let your blessing come upon our community gathered here before you. Bless us (+) and our advent wreath (+)

May the light that shines forth from it illumine our way as we journey towards Christmas; may the light that shines forth from it illumine our lives as we wait in hope for the birth of the Christ-child. We ask this through Christ who is the Light of the World. Amen.

*Advent Candle Lighting Liturgy - First Sunday of Advent, Year A: November 27, 2022, Up to Restoration (Isaiah 2:1-5, Psalm 122)

Reader One: "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" (*Psalm 122:1*).

Reader Two: We are glad. Whether we drove in or climbed up, whether we logged on or tuned in. We are glad to be here in this community, with this family. It is a place of joyful hope, of radical welcome. It is a place where, together, we can wait in wondrous anticipation of the kin-dom to come.

Reader One: "Many people will come and say: 'Come, let us climb God's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, Rachel, and Leah, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction will be given from Zion and the word of God from Jerusalem." (Isaiah 2:3)

Reader Two: We light this candle as a sign of our hope, our joyous hope that we can be restored—our faith restored,our strength restored, our confidence restored, our joy restored as we watch and wait with all God's people for the promise to be fulfilled.

Light the first candle on the Advent wreath.

Reflection - We Begin to Invite God In - The Rev. Scott Rosenstein

WE RESPOND

"Stay here, and keep watch with me." O Lord, You asked your disciples long ago to remain awake and they could not.

We know that we have been caught in the ways of this world and not simply in worldly measures of success, but the desire to make a better future for our children, to make things easier for our loved ones.

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, some people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Hurricane Ian raged, with widespread damage in Cuba, flooding and wind damage, storm surge and in-land flooding across Florida, and flooding threatening Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia.

Emergency response personnel are active. Relief agencies are meeting immediate needs where they can gain access to communities hard hit by the storm. United Church of Christ partners through National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster who focus on relief are implementing their plans. Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

May the light that shines forth from it illumine our way as we journey towards Christmas; may the light that shines forth from it illumine our lives as we wait in hope for the birth of the Christ-child. We ask this through Christ who is the Light of the World. Amen.

*Advent Candle Lighting Liturgy - First Sunday of Advent, Year A: November 27, 2022, Up to Restoration (Isaiah 2:1-5, Psalm 122)

Reader One: "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" (*Psalm 122:1*).

Reader Two: We are glad. Whether we drove in or climbed up, whether we logged on or tuned in. We are glad to be here in this community, with this family. It is a place of joyful hope, of radical welcome. It is a place where, together, we can wait in wondrous anticipation of the kin-dom to come.

Reader One: "Many people will come and say: 'Come, let us climb God's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, Rachel, and Leah, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction will be given from Zion and the word of God from Jerusalem." (Isaiah 2:3)

Reader Two: We light this candle as a sign of our hope, our joyous hope that we can be restored—our faith restored,our strength restored, our confidence restored, our joy restored as we watch and wait with all God's people for the promise to be fulfilled.

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, some people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Hurricane Ian raged, with widespread damage in Cuba, flooding and wind damage, storm surge and in-land flooding across Florida, and flooding threatening Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia.

Emergency response personnel are active. Relief agencies are meeting immediate needs where they can gain access to communities hard hit by the storm. United Church of Christ partners through National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster who focus on relief are implementing their plans. Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

122 1 How I rejoiced when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of God!"2 And now our feet are standing within your gates, Jerusalem.

3 Jerusalem restored!
The city, one united whole!
4 Here the tribes ascend,
the tribes of God.
They come to praise God's Name,
as God commanded Israel—

5 Here, where the tribunals of justice are, the judgment seats of David's house.

6 Pray for peace within Jerusalem: "May those who love you prosper!

7 May peace be in your walls! May your citadels be always secure!" 8 For the sake of my family and friends, I say, "Peace be within you!"
9 For the sake of the Sovereign our God, I will seek your good.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

Reader One: "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" (*Psalm 122:1*).

Reader Two: We are glad. Whether we drove in or climbed up, whether we logged on or tuned in. We are glad to be here in this community, with this family. It is a place of joyful hope, of radical welcome. It is a place where, together, we can wait in wondrous anticipation of the kin-dom to come.

Reader One: "Many people will come and say: 'Come, let us climb God's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, Rachel, and Leah, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction will be given from Zion and the word of God from Jerusalem." (Isaiah 2:3)

Reader Two: We light this candle as a sign of our hope, our joyous hope that we can be restored—our faith restored,our strength restored, our confidence restored, our joy restored as we watch and wait with all God's people for the promise to be fulfilled.

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, some people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Hurricane Ian raged, with widespread damage in Cuba, flooding and wind damage, storm surge and in-land flooding across Florida, and flooding threatening Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia.

Emergency response personnel are active. Relief agencies are meeting immediate needs where they can gain access to communities hard hit by the storm. United Church of Christ partners through National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster who focus on relief are implementing their plans. Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

122 1 How I rejoiced when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of God!"2 And now our feet are standing within your gates, Jerusalem.

3 Jerusalem restored!
The city, one united whole!
4 Here the tribes ascend,
the tribes of God.
They come to praise God's Name,
as God commanded Israel—

5 Here, where the tribunals of justice are, the judgment seats of David's house.

6 Pray for peace within Jerusalem: "May those who love you prosper!

7 May peace be in your walls! May your citadels be always secure!" 8 For the sake of my family and friends, I say, "Peace be within you!"
9 For the sake of the Sovereign our God, I will seek your good.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

May the light that shines forth from it illumine our way as we journey towards Christmas; may the light that shines forth from it illumine our lives as we wait in hope for the birth of the Christ-child. We ask this through Christ who is the Light of the World. Amen.

Reader One: "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" (*Psalm 122:1*).

Reader Two: We are glad. Whether we drove in or climbed up, whether we logged on or tuned in. We are glad to be here in this community, with this family. It is a place of joyful hope, of radical welcome. It is a place where, together, we can wait in wondrous anticipation of the kin-dom to come.

Reader One: "Many people will come and say: 'Come, let us climb God's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, Rachel, and Leah, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction will be given from Zion and the word of God from Jerusalem." (Isaiah 2:3)

Reader Two: We light this candle as a sign of our hope, our joyous hope that we can be restored—our faith restored,our strength restored, our confidence restored, our joy restored as we watch and wait with all God's people for the promise to be fulfilled.

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, some people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Hurricane Ian raged, with widespread damage in Cuba, flooding and wind damage, storm surge and in-land flooding across Florida, and flooding threatening Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia.

Emergency response personnel are active. Relief agencies are meeting immediate needs where they can gain access to communities hard hit by the storm. United Church of Christ partners through National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster who focus on relief are implementing their plans. Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

122 1 How I rejoiced when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of God!"2 And now our feet are standing within your gates, Jerusalem.

3 Jerusalem restored!
The city, one united whole!
4 Here the tribes ascend,
the tribes of God.
They come to praise God's Name,
as God commanded Israel—

5 Here, where the tribunals of justice are, the judgment seats of David's house.

6 Pray for peace within Jerusalem: "May those who love you prosper!

7 May peace be in your walls! May your citadels be always secure!" 8 For the sake of my family and friends, I say, "Peace be within you!"
9 For the sake of the Sovereign our God, I will seek your good.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

O God our God, we praise you for your Child, Jesus Christ. who is Emmanuel, the hope of all peoples; who is the wisdom that teaches and guides us; who is the Savior of every nation.

O God, let your blessing come upon our community gathered here before you. Bless us (+) and our advent wreath (+)

May the light that shines forth from it illumine our way as we journey towards Christmas; may the light that shines forth from it illumine our lives as we wait in hope for the birth of the Christ-child. We ask this through Christ who is the Light of the World. Amen.

Reader One: "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" (*Psalm 122:1*).

Reader Two: We are glad. Whether we drove in or climbed up, whether we logged on or tuned in. We are glad to be here in this community, with this family. It is a place of joyful hope, of radical welcome. It is a place where, together, we can wait in wondrous anticipation of the kin-dom to come.

Reader One: "Many people will come and say: 'Come, let us climb God's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, Rachel, and Leah, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction will be given from Zion and the word of God from Jerusalem." (Isaiah 2:3)

Reader Two: We light this candle as a sign of our hope, our joyous hope that we can be restored—our faith restored,our strength restored, our confidence restored, our joy restored as we watch and wait with all God's people for the promise to be fulfilled.

Light the first candle on the Advent wreath.

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. With wind speeds topping out at 130 miles per hour and 155 miles per hour, respectively, Hurricanes Fiona and Ian have left devastation in their wake. Fiona's winds left all of Puerto Rico in the dark, some people remain without power. Communities remain in crisis mode as the delivery of food, drinking water, and medical needs is challenged in hard-to-reach places cut off by downed trees, mudslides, and washed away bridges.

Millions have lost power and access to clean drinking water. The need for emergency food support, medical care, and temporary shelter is high.

Hurricane Ian raged, with widespread damage in Cuba, flooding and wind damage, storm surge and in-land flooding across Florida, and flooding threatening Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia.

Emergency response personnel are active. Relief agencies are meeting immediate needs where they can gain access to communities hard hit by the storm. United Church of Christ partners through National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster who focus on relief are implementing their plans. Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

This reading contains a vision shared with Micah 2:1-4. Both prophets witnessed terrible violence and the destruction of the northern kingdom of Israel, but they had hope that the southern kingdom of Judah might learn and change their ways. The two prophets shared a hope that the people would turn back to God and gather in Jerusalem at the temple, a hope the people would turn away from violence and war and instead turn to God, and other nations would follow suit, with lessons learned going forth from Jerusalem: peace in God's name.

2 1 This is what Isaiah ben-Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:2 In the last days, the mountain of YHWH's Temple

will be established as the most important mountain and raised above all other hills all nations will stream toward it. 3 Many people will come and say: "Come, let us climb YHWH's mountain to the Temple of the God of Jacob, that we may be instructed in God's ways and walk in God's paths." Instruction† will be given from Zion and the word of YHWH from Jerusalem. 4 God will judge between the nations and render decisions for many countries. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not raise the sword against another, and never again will they train for war. 5 O house of Leah and Rachel and Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of YHWH!

Psalm Response: Psalm 122 (Responsively)

Psalm 122 is a prayer for Jerusalem, the holy city, calling the people into worship and into God's ways of peace. Both the temple for God and the throne of David were established in Jerusalem, and the psalmist calls the people into worship, into a litany of praying for peace for the city and its people. For the sake of God, the psalmist prays that those who gather in worship seek the goodness and well-being of the city.

122 1 How I rejoiced when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of God!"2 And now our feet are standing within your gates, Jerusalem.

3 Jerusalem restored!
The city, one united whole!
4 Here the tribes ascend,
the tribes of God.
They come to praise God's Name,
as God commanded Israel—

5 Here, where the tribunals of justice are, the judgment seats of David's house.

6 Pray for peace within Jerusalem: "May those who love you prosper!

7 May peace be in your walls! May your citadels be always secure!" 8 For the sake of my family and friends, I say, "Peace be within you!"
9 For the sake of the Sovereign our God, I will seek your good.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

For Advent, the Epistle readings follow Romans (except for the third Sunday when the reading is from James). In this passage, Paul writes near the end of his letter that this is the time to wake up. This is the time to pay attention to how we live and act in this world. Paul is hoping that Christ's return is eminent, but even if it is not, this is always the time to live into the light, to live as if everything about us is exposed, and we have nothing to hide. Instead of acting in the way of this world and trying to mask who we are, Paul calls the believers to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, to let Christ be the face the world sees.

13 11 Besides, you know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. 12 The night is far spent; the day draws near. So let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us live honorably as in daylight, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14 Rather, clothe yourselves with our Savior Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the night.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus calls the disciples to keep awake in part of his final discourse in Matthew 24. Jesus shares the story of Noah as a warning, that people didn't heed the signs of the flood and simply focused on living their own lives. For those who do not pay attention to what is going on and focus on only themselves, they can neither perceive where God is at work nor how evil is at work in the world around us. Jesus then tells of the coming of the Promised One, where some are taken and some left—not a "rapture" as mythologized among some, but rather a metaphor to be ready, for Christ is at work in our world and lives and will be in a new, unexpected way. Like an owner of a house who would be prepared for anything if they were expecting a thief, so we must, as faithful followers of Jesus, be ready for Christ.

24 36 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God. 37 "The coming of the Promised One will be just like Noah's time. 38 In the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, having relationships and getting married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. 39 They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them. So it will be at the coming of the Promised One. 40 Two people will be out in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. 41 Two people will be grinding meal; one will be taken and one will be left. 42 Therefore be vigilant! For you don't know the day your Savior is coming. 43 "Be sure of this: if the owner of the house had known when the thief was coming, the owner would have kept a watchful eye and not allowed the house to be broken into. 44 You must be prepared in the same way. The Promised One is coming at the time you least expect.

Season of Advent and Advent Wreath Candle Lighting

Advent is the season of preparation for Christmas, but it is an active watching and waiting for the arrival of Christ in our world and in our lives in a new way. We read these passages pointing to the day of judgment and Christ's return to remind us that we are still actively waiting, alert and awake. Because of the Nativity story, that Christ came to us in a completely unexpected way as a newborn child, so in these days we must be ready for Christ to enter our world, our lives, and our hearts in an unexpected way. How do we live faithfully in times when our faith might be tested? When the world isn't as we hoped it would be? Where can we find signs of God's faithfulness in our lives, in the world around us?

Advent means "coming." It is a time of longing, watching, and praying for God's healing, transformative presence to be ever more vibrantly present in the world. In this sense, Advent is a season in which we focus on that key phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come." As Christians, the good news we strive to live by and declare is that love is stronger than hate, peace more enduring than war, hope more powerful than despair — and the light of God's love will dispel forever the shadows of shame cast by violence, suffering, sorrow, and contempt.

To help proclaim that God's new world is at hand, we are sharing four candle lighting litanies for personal, family-based, or congregational use during the holy season of Advent. The Candle-lighting liturgy for the Advent wreath ties into the worship theme, "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents."

Isaiah is our anchor text for this Advent worship series. But Psalms gives us the mood, theme, or even soul. "How I rejoiced when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of God!'" The opening line from Psalm 122 captures something of the Advent spirit this year. From "How I rejoiced" to "go to the house of God." We are singing a song of ascent this Advent season.

Let us go up. Up, why up? Going to God is always up. Going to worship is always up. That was a geographic reality for the Jewish people. Jerusalem was built on a hill, so no matter which direction you approached, you were going up. And since true worship could only happen in the temple, let us go up to worship is the description of the approach.

But what are we approaching? Well, worship of course. And something more. This is Advent, the season of anticipation, of watching and waiting – active waiting. Christmas? Well, no and yes. We're not trying to be mysterious here, but there is definitely a no and yes to that question.

No, the season of Advent isn't really designed to be a countdown to the celebration of Christmas. It is a time of preparation for Christ's return and the establishment of the kin-dom of God. It is a reminder that we are heading someplace; we are works in progress; we are longing for something more. That's the upward call of Advent. We sing an Advent song of ascent as we climb up to worship in that new reality, that new way of being in the world. Not that this is a human-made reality, but that we are longing for this completion. We are looking forward.

At the same time, we are indeed looking back. Yes, we are anticipating Incarnation, the time when God broke into our history and became present in an astonishing way. And we look forward to when Emmanuel – God with us – will be how we live always. We remember Christmas, the real depth and power of this singular act and the child who lived God's presence among us, something that even the worst of the commercialism cannot ultimately overcome. We can grumble about how we've lost the true meaning of Christmas in this crass and cynical age, and perhaps we should. But we can also be surprised at how something pure and wonderful can appear in the most unlikely places, from the most unlikely sources to remind us that we are all longing for something more, something of eternity and of the beloved community described by the one whose birth we celebrate. That is anticipation worthy of singing Advent songs of ascent.

Feel free to use these litanies in whatever ways you see fit this Advent — proclaiming all the while "Up to Restoration – An Advent Song of Ascents." Adapt them and make them your own!

While this year's hurricane season started slow, later developments have made it clear just how dangerous and destructive these storms can be. Emergency response personnel are active. Relief agencies are meeting immediate needs where they can gain access to communities hard hit by the storm. United Church of Christ partners through National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster who focus on relief are implementing their plans. Global Ministries Area Executive for Latin America Angel Luis Rivera is in touch with bilateral partners.

Conference leaders and Conference Disaster Coordinators are making contact, assessing needs, and communicating with the Global H.O.P.E. team so that help can be channeled, now and for the long term.
