

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1 Joy dawned again on Easter Day, the sun shone out with bright array; For when the Apostles hid in fear, the Risen Christ to them appeared.

2 O Jesus, Savior, Gentle One, come take our hearts to be your own, That we may give you all our days the willing tribute of our praise.

3 O Sovereign One, with us abide in this our joyful Easter-tide; From every weapon death can wield, your own redeemed forever shield.

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Act 2:14a, 22-32

The first selection for the Revised Common Lectionary for the season of Easter comes from the book of Acts. In this portion of Acts 2, on the day of Pentecost, Peter boldly declared that the work of the Holy Spirit was among the disciples. In this selection, Peter explained the purpose of Jesus's death—though crucified by human hands, Peter believed this was part of God's plan to free Jesus and all of humanity from death. Peter quoted from the Psalms, presuming the author to be David, and interpreted the life and words of David as foreshadowing and prophesying about Jesus, of whom Peter, the disciples, and everyone present on that day of Pentecost were witnesses.

2 14 Then Peter stood up with the Eleven and addressed the crowd: "Women and men of Judea, and all you who live in Jerusalem! Listen to what I have to say!

22 "People of Israel, hear this: Jesus of Nazareth was sent to you with miracles, portents and signs as his credentials—which God performed through him in your midst, as you well know. 23 Jesus was delivered up by the set purpose and plan of God; you even made use of godless people to crucify and kill him. 24 God freed him from death's bitter pangs, however, and raised him up again, for it was impossible that death could keep its hold on him. 25 David says,

'I have set our God ever before me;
God is at my right hand, and I will not be disturbed.
26 My heart has been glad, my tongue has rejoiced, my body will live on in hope,
27 for you will not abandon my soul to Hades, nor will you let your faithful one undergo decay.
28 You have shown me the paths of Life; you will fill me with joy in your presence.'

29 "Sisters and brothers, I can speak confidently to you about our ancestor David. He died and was buried, and his grave is with us to this day. 30 But he was a prophet, and he knew that God had promised him with an oath that one of his descendants would sit upon his throne. 31 So what he was foreseeing and talking about was the resurrection of the Messiah: the one not abandoned to the underworld, whose body didn't decay. 32 God raised Jesus to life, and we are all witnesses to that.

Psalm Response: Psalm 16 (Responsively)

Psalm 16 is a prayer for help and assurance that God is the one true God. The psalmist asks God for deliverance because they have remained faithful to God, choosing no other gods. The psalmist refuses to participate in the worship of other gods, but blesses, rejoices, and give thanks to God who has provided for them. God has not abandoned them to death, but instead, God has instructed them in the way of life, and there are always blessings for those who remain faithful to God.

- 1 O God, keep me safe—you are my refuge!2 I said to God, "You are my God;
- there is nothing good for me apart from you."
- 3 The holy people of my land are wonderful! My greatest pleasure is to be with them.
- 4 But those who rush after other gods will bring many troubles upon themselves. I will not take part in their sacrifices; I won't even speak the names of their gods.
- 5 You, God, are all that I have, you are my food and drink. My life is safe in your hands.
- 6 Within the boundaries you set for me there are nothing but pleasant places!

What a delightful inheritance I have!

- 7 I praise God, who guides me; even at night my heart teaches me.
- 8 I'm always aware of your presence; you are right by my side, and nothing can shake me.
- 9 My heart is happy and my tongue sings for joy; I feel completely safe with you,
- 10 because you won't abandon me to the Grave; you won't let your loved one see decay.
- 11 You show me the path to Life; your presence fills me with joy, and by your side I find enduring pleasure.

Second Reading: 1 Peter 1:3-9

The Epistle readings for this season of Easter are from 1 Peter. In these verses of chapter 1, the writer speaks of the new hope given to us through the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. At the time of the writing of 1 Peter, Jesus' death, resurrection, and ascension had occurred a few generations before, and believers were weary in waiting for Christ's return. The writer assured the believers that in faithfulness, God would reveal all. The faithful were struggling and suffering in that time and needed assurance. In their genuineness of faith and trust in Jesus, the author wrote that they would come to know unspeakable joy. They may rejoice in their salvation because Jesus was raised from the dead.

1 3 Praised be the Abba God of our Savior Jesus Christ, who with great mercy gave us new birth: a birth into hope, which draws its life from the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead; 4 a birth to an imperishable inheritance incapable of fading or defilement, which is kept in heaven for you 5 who are guarded with God's power through faith; a birth to a salvation which stands ready to be revealed in the last days.

6 There is cause for rejoicing here. You may, for a time, have to suffer the distress of many trials. 7 But this is so that your faith, which is more precious than the passing splendor of fire-tried gold, may by its genuineness lead to praise, glory and honor when Jesus Christ appears. 8 Although you have never seen Christ, you love Christ; and without seeing, you still believe, and you rejoice with inexpressible joy touched with glory, 9 because you are achieving faith's goal—your salvation.

Gospel Reading: John 20:19-31

These verses in John 20 continue the story of Easter Sunday, with the appearance of Jesus to the disciples the same evening Mary found him in the garden. However, Thomas was not with them. Jesus said, "Peace be with you," to the disciples as he showed them his hands and his side, and he breathed on them, sharing with them the Holy Spirit. Since Thomas was not with them, when they told Thomas what happened, he said he wouldn't believe unless he also saw Jesus's hands and side. The next week, Thomas was with them, and even though the doors were shut (just like the last week)

Jesus appeared to them, and showed Thomas his hands and side, and told him not to doubt but believe. When Thomas finally declared that this was Jesus who appeared to him, Jesus said, "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." When one follows the story of Thomas through John's Gospel account, one sees a follower who goes from great zeal "Let us also go that we may die with him" (11:16), to "Lord, we don't know where you are going. How can we know the way?" (14:5) to scattering with the other disciples after Jesus's betrayal, to missing out on the first appearance of Jesus to the disciples. Thomas thought he knew who Jesus was and what Jesus' movement was about. When he realized he didn't know, doubt entered in. But the faith of his friends brought him back to the room where it happened.

20 19 In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were locked in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Temple authorities.

Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." 20 Having said this, the savior showed them the marks of crucifixion.

The disciples were filled with joy when they saw Jesus, 21 who said to them again, "Peace be with you. As Abba God sent me, so I'm sending you."

22 After saying this, Jesus breathed on them and said,

"Receive the Holy Spirit.

23 If you forgive anyone's sins, they are forgiven. If you retain anyone's sins, they are retained."

24 It happened that one of the Twelve, Thomas—nicknamed Didymus, or "Twin"—was absent when Jesus came. 25 The other disciples kept telling him,

"We've seen Jesus!"

Thomas' answer was, "I'll never believe it without putting my finger in the nail marks and my hand into the spear wound."

26 On the eighth day, the disciples were once more in the room, and this time Thomas was with them. Despite the locked doors, Jesus came and stood before them, saying, "Peace be with you."

27 Then, to Thomas, Jesus said, "Take your finger and examine my hands. Put your hand into my side. Don't persist in your unbelief, but believe!"

28 Thomas said in response, "My Savior and my God!"

29 Jesus then said, "You've become a believer because you saw me.
Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed."

30 Jesus performed many other signs as well—signs not recorded here—in the presence of the disciples. 31 But these have been recorded to help you believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Only Begotten, so that by believing you may have life in Jesus' Name.
