A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Jeremiah 20:7-13

Ever wondered how hard it was to be a prophet? In these verses of Jeremiah 20, Jeremiah complains that God has enticed him to speak up and look what he gets for it? Nothing but trouble. Jeremiah feels he must declare violence and destruction to the people, but he hates doing it. If he tries not to speak on behalf of God, the fire inside of him burns and he can't keep it in. Everyone else is waiting for him to screw up so they can pounce on him, even his close friends. Nonetheless, Jeremiah knows that God is with him and those persecuting him will not prevail. God is the one who will deliver him. Content Warning: the English translations of this passage are tamer than the Hebrew, which uses the language of rape to describe Jeremiah being compelled to prophecy by God and that same language of his friends working against him.

20 7 You fooled me, YHWH, and I let myself be fooled.

You were too strong for me, and you triumphed. All day long, I am an object of laughter. Everyone mocks me.

8 Whenever I speak, I must cry out, proclaiming violence and desolation. The word of YHWH has brought me

derision and reproach all day long.

9 I say to myself, "I will not mention God, nor will I speak in the Name of YHWH anymore." But then it becomes like fire burning in my heart, imprisoned in my bones. I grow weary holding it in, I cannot endure it.

10 Yes, I hear the whispering of many,

"Terror all around!

Denounce him!

Let us denounce Jeremiah!"

All who were my friends

are watching for any misstep. They say, "Perhaps he will trip up,

then we can get the better of him

and take our vengeance on him."

11 But YHWH is with me, like a terrifying warrior.

My persecutors will trip up;

they will not triumph. They will be put to utter shame,

to lasting, unforgettable disgrace.

12 YHWH Omnipotent, you who test the just,

who probe both mind and heart,

let me witness the vengeance you take on them,

for to you I have entrusted my cause.

13 Sing to YHWH, praise to YHWH, for God has rescued the life of those who are poor from the power of those who are corrupt!

Psalm Response: Psalm 69:7-18 (Responsively)

Psalm 69 is a prayer for deliverance from persecution. In verses 7-10, the psalmist reminds God that it is for God's sake they have been shamed, that their family has disowned them, for the psalmist is being blamed for what God has called them to do and insulted for being humble. In verses 11-15, the psalmist continues to share that they are ridiculed and gossiped about, but they pray to God because they trust that God will deliver them from their enemies. They call upon God to not let them die. In verses 16-18, the psalmist turns to God, calling upon God to answer them in according to God's mercy, and calls upon God to draw near to them and set them free from their enemies.

- **69** 7 since it is for your sake that I bear insult, that shame covers my face.
- 8 I've become an outcast in my own family, a stranger to my mother's children—
- 9 and because I am consumed with zeal for your House, the insults of those who ridicule you fall upon me.
- 10 When I weep and fast,
 I receive nothing but abuse.
- 11 When I dress in sackcloth, I am called a buffoon.
- 12 They sit at the gate gossiping about me, and drunks make me the butt of their songs.
- 13 But I pray to you, God, for the time of your favor, O God! In your great love, answer me! With you is sure deliverance!
- 14 Rescue me from the quicksand—don't let me sink! Let me be rescued from my enemies, and from the watery depths.
- 15 Don't let the raging flood engulf me, don't let the abyss swallow me up, or the pit close its mouth over me.
- 16 Answer me, God, for your love is wonderful! In your great mercy, turn toward me.
- 17 Don't hide your face from your faithful one; I am in trouble—hurry and answer me!

18 Come and ransom my life; as an answer to my enemies, redeem me.

Second Reading: Roman 6:1b-11

The Epistle reading continues in Romans with chapter 6. The apostle Paul uses rhetoric here to say that even though it is faith that saves instead of the law, believers are not to continue in sin. Through Christ, we have died to sin and have been raised to life. Knowing that we are united in a resurrection like Christ's, we are called to live as alive in Christ. Sin has no power over us, but if we know Jesus Christ, we live in the newness of life. Sin holds us back; Christ sets us free.

6:1 What can we say, then? Should we go on sinning so that grace might abound? 2 Of course not! We're dead to sin, so how can we continue to live in it?

3 Don't you know that when we were baptized into Christ Jesus, we were baptized into Christ's death? 4 We've been buried with Jesus through baptism, and we joined with Jesus in death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by God's glory, we too might live a new life.

5 For if we have been united with Christ in the likeness of Christ's death, we will also be united with Christ in the likeness of Christ's resurrection. 6 We must realize that our former selves have been crucified with Christ to make the body of sin and failure completely powerless, to free us from slavery to sin: 7 for when people die, they have finished with sin.

8 But we believe that, having died with Christ, we will also live with Christ—9 knowing that Christ, having been raised from the dead, will never die again: death is now powerless over our Savior. 10 When Christ died, Christ died to sin, once for all, so that the life Christ lives is now life in God. 11 In this way, you too must consider yourselves to be dead to sin—but alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 10:24-39

Continuing from last week's gospel lesson, Jesus is giving the disciples further instructions before they head out in ministry. Jesus reminds the disciples that they are not above the teacher, but a disciple ought to be like the teacher. Nonetheless, Jesus also warns them that the insults thrown at him (such as calling him Beelzebul) will be even greater toward them. Jesus then instructs them to not be afraid and to share everything he has taught them, and that they are precious to God. If they are faithful to Christ, Christ will be with them, but whoever denies Christ, Christ will deny them before God. Jesus further warns the disciples that his teachings will bring division, not peace. Just as Jesus's own family at first tried to stop him, so will some of the disciples' families and friends. Those who follow Jesus must be willing to let go of everything, even families, if they hold them back from following Christ. Those who are willing to give up everything for Christ's sake will find everything of purpose and meaning is in Christ.

10 24 "A student is not superior to the teacher; the follower is not above the leader. 25 The student should be glad simply to become like the teacher, the follower like the leader.

"If the head of the house has been called Beelzebul, how much more the members of the household!

26 "Don't let people intimidate you. Nothing is concealed that will not be revealed, and nothing is hidden that will not be made known. 27 What I tell you in darkness, speak in the light. What you hear in private, proclaim from the housetops.

28 "Don't fear those who can deprive the body of life but can't destroy the soul. Rather, fear the one who can destroy both body and soul in Gehenna.

29 "Are not the sparrows sold for pennies? Yet not a single sparrow falls to the ground without your Abba God's knowledge. 30 As for you, every hair of your head has been counted. 31 So don't be afraid of anything—you are worth more than an entire flock of sparrows.

32 "Whoever acknowledges me before others, I will acknowledge before Abba God in heaven. 33 Whoever disowns me before others, I will disown before Abba God in heaven.

34 "Don't suppose that I came to bring peace on earth. I came not to bring peace, but a sword. 35 I have come to turn

37 "Those who love mother or father, daughter or son more than me are not worthy of me. 38 Those who will not carry with them the instrument of their own death—following in my footsteps—are not worthy of me.

Season after Pentecost A, Part 1 (Year A, June 4 – August 27, 2023) Embracing the Kin-dom: 2023

"As you sent me into the world, so I have sent them into the world." (John 17:18 CEB)

The longest season of the liturgical calendar are filled with Sundays called "Ordinary Time." It begins with Trinity Sunday and ends with the Reign of Christ. We move from concentrating on the event of Christ in the world and shift to the impact of being in Christ in the world. A life in the unity of the Trinity is one of being shaped and sent daily in the image and in the purpose of Holy Love.

General Synod 34 (June 30-July 4, 2023) - biennial national gathering of the United Church of Christ

General Synod 34, the biennial national gathering of the United Church of Christ, will be in Indianapolis from June 30 – July 4, 2023. The theme is: "Making All Things New" drawn from the text of Isaiah 43:18-19:

"Do not remember the former things or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert."

Introducing the keynote speaker, Rev. Nadia Bolz-Weber

Nadia Bolz-Weber is an ordained Lutheran Pastor, described by one national news service as "a former standup comedian and recovering alcoholic with a streak of dark humor." Another news outlet noted her "unusual form of evangelism," which "may be the only kind that can break through the crust of dislike and suspicion which insulates increasing numbers of younger Americans from Christianity.

Bolz-Weber is a best-selling author and founding pastor of House for All Sinners & Saints in Denver, Colorado

She writes and speaks about personal failings, recovery, grace, faith, and really whatever the hell else she wants to. As for herself, the Rev. Nadia Bolz-Weber says she's someone who "always sits in the corner with the other weirdos."

Bolz-Weber will speak Saturday, July 1, during the UCC's biennial national meeting at the Indiana Convention Center in Indianapolis.

Having led the Denver congregation from 2008 to 2015, Bolz-Weber now pursues ministry as a "public theologian." This takes several forms:

- Her podcast, "The Confessional," encourages listeners to "forget the selfies and social media updates of everyone at their best." As its host, she "invites guests to share stories about times they were at their worst."
- She describes her interactive newsletter, "The Corners," as "water, God willing, for those planted in the corners" of life.
- National and international news outlets have profiled her and her ministry. They include The New Yorker, BBC News, The Guardian, The Atlantic, NPR, The Washington Post, Religion News Service, and, in Germany, Die Zeit.
- She is the subject of dozens of online videos. An example is a series of brief "Have A Little Faith" episodes at the MAKERS YouTube channel. They have received tens of thousands of views.

Her books include three memoirs that made The New York Times best-seller list: *Pastrix: The Cranky, Beautiful Faith of a Sinner and Saint (2013, updated 2021); Accidental Saints: Finding God in All the Wrong People (2015) and Shameless: A Case for Not Feeling Bad About Feeling Good (About Sex) (2019).*

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, which ordained her in 2008, formalized that ministry in 2021 when it installed her as pastor for public witness with its Rocky Mountain Synod. The ELCA is a "full communion" partner of the UCC.
