

A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: 1 Kings 19:8-18

In this selection of the Hebrew scriptures, the prophet Elijah had been on the run from King Ahab and Queen Jezebel. In the previous verses, Elijah was so weary he wanted to die, but an angel from God made him get up and eat twice so that he had the strength to continue on his journey. In these verses, Elijah complained to God that there was no one left in Israel faithful to God, that they had all turned away from God. Elijah seemed to have forgotten that in the previous chapter Obadiah, King Ahab's servant in charge of the palace, remained faithful to God, to the point of hiding 100 prophets loyal to God in two caves with bread and water. So Elijah was not the only one—but he certainly felt like it. Elijah felt that no one was left, so God told Elijah that God would draw near to him. However, God was not present in the ways that ancient deities were often made known. God was not present in the wind, earthquake, or fire—but only in the silence. Not in the forces of destruction, not in the assurance of answers, but in the quietness. That's when Elijah wrapped his face (because in the ancient world the belief was if you saw the face of God, you would not live) and stood at the entrance to the cave. There, Elijah spoke with God, and even though he repeated again his belief that he was the only faithful one left, God showed him that he was not. There were others in Israel who had not bowed to the other gods. While Elijah's work was not yet finished, God showed him there would be new kings and even a new prophet. The distress, discomfort and depression Elijah felt would not last forever. Elijah would receive help, and relief.

19 8 Elijah got up and ate and drank; then he went in the strength of that food forty days and forty nights to Horeb the mount of God. 9 There Elijah went into a cave and spent the night. And the word of YHWH came to him: "What are you doing here, Elijah?"

10 Elijah replied, "I have been very zealous for YHWH God Omnipotent. The people of Israel have abandoned your covenant, broken down your altars, and put your prophets to death by the sword. I am the only one left, and now they're trying to kill me, too."

11 God said, "Go out and stand on the mountain in the presence of YHWH, for YHWH is about to pass by."

Then a great and powerful wind tore the mountain apart and shattered the rocks by YHWH's power—but YHWH was not in the whirlwind. After the wind there was an earthquake—but YHWH was not in the earthquake. 12 After the earthquake came a fire—but YHWH was not in the fire. And after the fire came a sound of sheer silence.

13 When Elijah heard it, he pulled his cloak over his face and went out and stood at the mouth of the cave. Then a voice said to him, "What are you doing here, Elijah?"

14 Elijah replied, "I have been very zealous for YHWH God Omnipotent. The people of Israel have abandoned your covenant, broken down your altars, and put your prophets to death by the sword. I am the only one left, and now they're trying to kill me, too."

15 YHWH told Elijah, "Go back the way you came, to the Desert of Damascus. When you get there, anoint Hazael as ruler of Aram *(Syria)*. 16 Also anoint Jehu ben-Nimshi as ruler over Israel, and anoint Elisha ben-Shaphat, from Abel Meholah, to succeed you as prophet. 17 Jehu will put to death any who escape the sword of Hazael, and Elisha will put to death any who escape the sword of Jehu. 18 Yet I reserve 7,000 in Israel—all whose knees have not bowed down to Ba'al and all whose mouths have not kissed his images."

Psalm Response: Psalm 85: 8-13 (Responsively)

Psalm 85 is a song of God's faithfulness even though the people have gone astray. In verses 8-13, the psalmist concludes that for those who are faithful, for those who remain in awe, God will bring all good things together. Poetically, the psalmist imagines steadfast love and faithfulness meeting, righteousness and peace greeting each other in an embrace. Faithfulness springs up from the ground while righteousness reaches down from the sky. God draws forth everything together in goodness and leads the people in the way of peace and righteousness.

- **85** 8 I will listen to what you have to say, God a voice that speaks of peace, peace for your people and your friends so long as they don't return to their folly.
- 9 Your salvation is near for those who revere you and your glory will dwell in our land.
- 10 Love and faithfulness have met; justice and peace have embraced.
- 11 Fidelity will sprout from the earth and justice will lean down from heaven.
- 12 God will give us what is good, and our land will yield its harvest.
- 13 Justice will march before you, God, and peace will prepare the way for your steps.

Second Reading: Roman 10:5-15

The Epistle reading continues its series in Romans with these verses in chapter 10. The apostle Paul, writing to the church in Rome, explains that it is by faith that people live out their belief, not by the law. Faith leads us to confession. We cannot confess what we do not believe. It is through belief that we live into God's ways. This faith is available to all people of all backgrounds. However, no one can believe if they haven't had the faith shared with them, so believers must share the good news, for they are sent by God to do so.

10 5 Moses writes about the righteousness that comes from the Law: "Those who do these things will live by them." 6 But the righteousness that comes from faith says, "Don't say in your heart, 'Who will ascend to heaven?'" —that is, to bring Christ down—7 "or 'Who will descend into the underworld?' "—that is, to bring Christ up from the dead. 8 But what does it say? "The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart." This is the Word of faith. 9 For if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Sovereign and believe in your heart that God raised Jesus from the dead, you will be saved. 10 Faith in the heart leads to being put right with God, confession on the lips to our deliverance.

11 Scripture says, "No one who believes in God will be put to shame." 12 Here there is no difference between Jew and Greek; all have the same Creator, rich in mercy toward those who call: 13 "Everyone who calls on the name of the Most High will be saved."

14 How then can they call on the One in whom they have not believed? And how can they believe in the One about whom they have not heard? And how can they hear if no one preaches to them? 15 And how can they preach unless they are sent? As scripture says, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring the Good News!"

Gospel Reading: Matthew 14:22:33

After feeding the crowds, the disciples had traveled across the lake in a boat, but Jesus had remained behind to dismiss the crowds and to have some time to pray alone on the mountain.

The boat had drifted away in the evening due to the winds and the waves, so that morning, Jesus rejoined them by walking across the lake. The disciples were afraid, but Jesus encouraged them and told them it was him. Peter challenged Jesus, saying if it was him, Jesus should call for Peter to come out of the boat. Jesus called for Peter, and Peter took a few steps, but then he noticed the wind, became afraid, and started to sink. Jesus reached for Peter, but questioned him as to why he doubted. The rest of the disciples worshiped Jesus, proclaiming Jesus as God's Own.

14 22 Jesus insisted that the disciples get into the boat and precede him to the other side. 23 Having sent the crowds away, he went up on the mountain by himself to pray, remaining there alone as night fell. 24 Meanwhile the boat, already a thousand yards from shore, was being tossed about in the waves which had been raised by the fierce winds.

25 At about three in the morning, Jesus came walking toward them on the lake. 26 When the disciples saw Jesus walking on the water, they were terrified. "It is a ghost!" they said, and in their fear they began to cry out.

27 Jesus hastened to reassure them: "Don't worry, it's me! Don't be afraid!"

28 Peter spoke up and said, "If it is really you, tell me to come to you across the water."

29 "Come!" Jesus said. So Peter got out of the boat and began to walk on the water toward Jesus. 30 But when he saw how strong the wind was, he became frightened. He began to sink, and cried out, "Save me!"

31 Jesus immediately stretched out his hand and caught Peter. "You have so little faith!" Jesus said to him. "Why did you doubt?"

32 Once they had climbed into the boat, the wind died down. 33 Those, who were in the boat, showed great reverence, declaring to Jesus, "You are indeed God's Own!"

Responding to Wildfires on the Hawaiian Islands



From David K. Popham, Conference Minister, Hawai'i Conference, United Church of Christ :

"No doubt, like me, you watched in horror the newscasts and read news stories as the fires spread across Maui and Hawai'i Island. Most heartrending, at this time, are the images of Lahaina on fire. Due to limited phone access, we are still seeking firm information regarding people and church properties directly affected.

We do know the following limited information: Waiola Church fellowship hall burned in the fire, we do not have word on their sanctuary. We know the Campbell House and adjacent park were also in the path of the Lahaina fire. We have heard that many church members are affected by the evacuation orders, but we do not know the status of their homes at this time. On Hawai'i Island we know that access to some churches were blocked by fires. Six fatalities [as of August 11, 2023 – 55 fatalities] have been reported so far.

In these times we want to be of help and assistance to our 'ohana in distress. Offerings and collections taken through your local church can be sent to the Conference Office where we will work to distribute the funds to devastated areas and those in need. Individuals may also donate online directly through the Conference's Hawai'i 2023 Wildfires Relief Fund (part of the Conference's general "Hawai'i Disaster Relief Fund," which is also accessible via our website at hcucc.org/donate.)"

Turkish authorities say some 13.5 million people have been affected in an area spanning roughly 280 miles from Adana in the west to Diyarbakir in the east, and 186 miles from Malatya in the north to Hatay in the south. At least 44,374 deaths have been reported in Turkey, while 5,800 951 people have died in Syria. Be with all who grieve and mourn the loss of loved ones, homes, businesses, and infrastructure. Please help the survivors to process and move through the trauma, and to rebuild their lives and communities.
- We pray as well for the people of Vermont, upstate New York, and the Canadian province of Nova Scotia affected by catastrophic flooding. Be with all who grieve and mourn the loss of homes, businesses, and infrastructure. Please help the survivors to process and move through the trauma, and to rebuild their lives and communities.
- Residents of California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, the SE United States and Florida experiencing many days of very high temperatures and heat.
- In early August 2023, a series of wildfires broke out in the U.S. state of Hawaii. Affecting the island of Maui, and to a lesser extent Hawai'i (also known as the Big Island), the wind-driven fires prompted evacuations, caused widespread damage, and killed at least 55 people in the town of Lahaina. The proliferation of the wildfires was attributed to dry, gusty conditions created by a strong high-pressure area north of Hawaii and Hurricane Dora to the south. By August 9, the state government of Hawaii issued a state of emergency for the entirety of the state. On August 10, President Biden issued a federal major disaster declaration. The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 430 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of August 9th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.

Cleveland-based United Church of Christ elects first woman as leader

CLEVELAND, Ohio – The United Church of Christ has elected the **Rev. Karen Georgia Thompson** as the first woman to lead the denomination as General Minister and President.

The General Synod, the governing body of the church that is based in Cleveland, voted Monday to elect Thompson during its 34th annual gathering in Indianapolis with 626 delegates voting for her election, 43 against and seven abstaining. Thompson is also the first Black woman to lead the church.

Thompson is a Jamaican immigrant and is the third person of African descent to serve as leader of the denomination. She is the third woman nominated for the post, but she is the first to be elected.

"Today, United Church of Christ, we created a first together," she said after the vote. "It won't be the last first."

She will start her new role Aug. 1, taking over from the Rev. John Dorhauer, who has served for the past eight years.

Thompson has served in the National Setting of the United Church of Christ since 2009 as minister for racial justice and minister for ecumenical and interfaith relations. Prior to joining the national staff, she was on staff for UCC's Florida Conference, as a church planter in Florida and in family ministries in New York.

Thompson holds a doctorate in ministry, with a dissertation in religious multiplicity among African Caribbean people, from Seattle University; a master's of divinity from Union Theological Seminary; and a master's of public administration from North Carolina Central University.

"As I stand here before you as your newly and duly elected general minister and president, I stand here as a Jamaican immigrant woman, a mother and a grandmother, a sister and a friend to many," Thompson said in a statement released through the church. "The enormity of this moment will be with me for many years to come."
