A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading: Ezekiel 18: 1-4, 25-32

The reading from the Hebrew scriptures turns to the prophet Ezekiel A troubling passage, the first four verses of Ezekiel 18 use a common saying among the people that Jeremiah 31:29-30 also questions, about parents eating sour grapes and children suffering for it. In short, the idea that children would suffer because of the sins of their parents is put to rest by these two prophets. Those who sin will be responsible for the repercussions of their actions. In Ezekiel's view, everyone has sinned, and everyone is responsible, not God, for the consequences of their actions. Verses 25-32 continue this discourse. The people say that God's ways are unfair, but they are the ones breaking from God's ways repeatedly. In God's view, the people's ways are unfair because they are still unjust and irresponsible—all of them. But if the people repent and turn back to God, they will find life. This is what God desires—that they find a new heart and new spirit. God does not desire destruction and death, but life.

18 1 The word of YHWH came to me: 2 "What do you mean by repeating this proverb about the land of Israel:

'Parents eat sour grapes and their children's teeth are set on edge'?

3 "As I live, says Sovereign YHWH, you will no longer quote this proverb in Israel. 4 For every living soul belongs to me—the parents as well as the child; both alike belong to me. It is only the person who sins who will die.

25 "Yet you say, 'The way of YHWH is not just.' Listen, you Israelites! Am I unjust? It is your ways that are unjust. 26 If those who are just turn from their integrity, take to evil ways, and die, it is because of their evil ways that they die. 27 If sinners give up their evil ways and do what is just and right, they preserve their life. 28 They acknowledged their sins and turned their backs on all their wrongdoing, and they will live. 29 'YHWH is not just,' say the Israelites. No, it is you, Israel, who is unjust, not I!

30 "Therefore, House of Israel, I will judge you, each one according to your ways, says Sovereign YHWH. Repent! Turn from your evil. Otherwise, your corruption will be your ruin. 31 Rid yourself of your offenses, and get yourselves a new heart and a new spirit. Why should you Israelites die? 32 For I take no pleasure in anyone's death, says Sovereign YHWH.

Psalm Response: Psalm 25:1-9 (Responsively)

Psalm 25 is an alphabet acrostic poem, with each verse beginning with the next letter of the Hebrew alphabet. Verses 1-9 is a plea to God to not allow their enemies to overtake them, and for God to make known God's ways. The psalmist desires for God to lead them because they want to follow God all their days. The author seeks forgiveness for the sins of their youth and to remember God's faithfulness and steadfast love. God is a good teacher, leading sinners in the right way, and teaches those who are humble in the ways of justice.

- 1 To you, O God, I lift up my soul.
- 2 My God, I trust in you; don't let me be ashamed, don't let my enemies triumph over me.
- 3 No—none who hope in you will be ashamed, but shame will come to the wantonly treacherous.
- 4 Show me your ways, O God! Teach me your paths!
- 5 Lead me in your truth and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation. I wait all the day long for you.
- 6 Remember your mercies, O God, your love—your ancient and unwavering love!
- 7 Pardon the sins of my youth and my rebellious ways; remember me because of your love, because of your goodness, God!
- 8 And how good and upright you are, God! You instruct sinners in the path,
- 9 you guide those who are humble in what is right, and teach them your way.

Second Reading: Philippians 2:1-13

The Epistle reading continues its series in Philippians with these verses in chapter 2. A theme of the apostle Paul's letter to the church in Philippi is to be of the same mind and to have the same love. This doesn't mean one necessarily agrees with everything, but that they remember their purpose is to follow Jesus Christ. Verses 6-11 contain an ancient confession of Christ, the one who was equal to God but did not exploit his power, emptied himself and became humble to the point of death on the cross. Because of Christ's humility, we all ought to humble ourselves before the name of Jesus Christ, who has been exalted by God. Verses 12-13 contain encouragement for the people of Philippi to know Christ's salvation personally in their lives, because God is at work in each of them. The urging of unity comes with the understanding that each person has a relationship with Christ, and that in humility, we serve and worship Christ together.

2 1 If our life in Christ means anything to you—if love, or the Spirit that we have in common, or any tenderness or sympathy can persuade you at all—2 then be united in your convictions and united in your love, with a common purpose and a common mind. That is the one thing that would make me completely happy. 3 There must be no competition among you, no conceit, but everybody is to be humble: value others over yourselves, 4 each of you thinking of the interests of others before your own. 5 Your attitude must be the same as that of Christ Jesus:

- 6 Christ, though in the image of God, didn't deem equality with God something to be clung to—
 7 but instead became completely empty and took on the image of oppressed humankind: born into the human condition, found in the likeness of a human being.
 8 Jesus was thus humbled—
 obediently accepting death, even death on a cross!
 9 Because of this, God highly exalted Christ and gave to Jesus the name above every other name,
 10 so that at the name of Jesus every knee must bend in the heavens, on the earth and under the earth,
 11 and every tongue proclaim to the glory of God: Jesus Christ reigns supreme!
- 12 Therefore, my dear friends, you who are always obedient to my urging, work out your salvation with fear and trembling, not only when I happen to be with you, but all the more now that I'm absent. 13 It is God at work in you that creates the desire to do God's will.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 21:23-32

Jesus's authority is challenged in these verses in Matthew 21. Jesus doesn't come from a recognizable group, and so members of other first-century Jewish groups want to know who he is. Jesus, in turn, asks them a question about John the Baptizer's authority, knowing that the crowd would have strong opinions about it because they liked John. So when those who questioned Jesus refuse to respond, Jesus also refuses to respond directly. Instead, Jesus tells a parable about a landowner's two children and who obeys God. Is it the one who said they would do something and failed to do it, or the one who refused but later changed their mind? A good question for us today is who really has the authority—the people who claim the moral high ground but don't think it applies to their own personal lives, judge others and treat others poorly, or those who know they struggle and are not perfect, but attempt to live into justice and compassion for all?

- **21** 23 Jesus entered the Temple precincts and began teaching. The chief priests and the elders of the people came to him and said, "By what authority are you doing what you do? Who gave you this authority?"
- 24 "And I," replied Jesus, "will ask you a single question; if you give me the answer, I will tell you my authority for these actions. 25 What was the origin of John's right to baptize? Was it divine or was it human?"

They discussed it among themselves and said, "If we say, 'divine,' he will respond, 'Then why did you refuse to believe him?' 26 But if we say 'human,' we have the people to fear, for they regard John as a prophet." 27 So they replied to Jesus, "We don't know."

Jesus said in reply, "Neither will I tell you by what authority I am doing these things." 28 Jesus continued, "What do you think? There was a landowner who had two children.

The landowner approached the elder and said, 'My child, go out and work in the vineyard today.' 29 This first child replied, 'No, I won't,' but afterwards regretted it and went. 30 The landowner then came to the second child and said the same thing. The second child said in reply, 'I'm on my way,' but never went. 31 Which of the two did what was wanted?"

They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "The truth is, tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kindom of God before you. 32 When John came walking on the road of justice, you didn't believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes did. Yet even when you saw that, you didn't repent and believe.

World Communion Sunday

On the first Sunday in October, United Church of Christ congregations join many Christian churches across the globe in celebrating World Communion Sunday.

World Communion Sunday began as World-Wide Communion Sunday at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in 1933. The Rev. Hugh Thompson Kerr and his congregation sought to demonstrate the interconnectedness of Christian churches, regardless of denomination.

Rev. Kerr appropriately chose the sacrament of Holy Communion to symbolize this unity.

In 1940, the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America (now the National Council of Churches), which included all of the predecessor denominations of the United Church of Christ, adopted World-Wide Communion Sunday. The global celebration occurs on the first Sunday in October.

Today, the United Church of Christ celebrates World Communion Sunday with congregations all over the globe. Followers of Jesus Christ in large churches and small, on farms and in cities, in ornate buildings and under tents, gather to receive the bread and cup of Holy Communion.

Some will receive cubes of bread. Some will tear from a common loaf. Some will receive a wafer.

Some will drink from a common chalice. Some will dip a piece of bread into the cup. Some will have individual glasses. Some will use wine; some juice. Some will offer both.

Pastors will lead a variety of liturgies, in many languages. Clergy will dress traditionally, formally, and casually.

Despite the differences in our denominations and traditions, we celebrate our unity in Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.

- We pray as well for the people of Vermont, upstate New York, and the Canadian province of Nova Scotia affected by catastrophic flooding.
- In early August 2023, a series of wildfires broke out in the U.S. state of Hawai'i. Affecting the island of Maui, and to a lesser extent Hawai'i (also known as the Big Island), the wind-driven fires prompted evacuations, caused widespread damage, and killed at least 96 people in the town of Lahaina. The proliferation of the wildfires was attributed to dry, gusty conditions created by a strong high-pressure area north of Hawaii and Hurricane Dora to the south. By August 9, the state government of Hawaii issued a state of emergency for the entirety of the state. On August 10, President Biden issued a federal major disaster declaration. The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.
- On September 8, 2023 an earthquake with a moment magnitude of 6.8–6.9 struck Morocco's Marrakesh–Safi region. The earthquake's epicentre was located 45.6 miles southwest of Marrakesh, in the Atlas Mountains. At least 2,946 deaths were reported, with most occurring outside Marrakesh. Damage was widespread, and historic landmarks in Marrakesh were destroyed. The earthquake wasalso felt in Spain, Portugal, and Algeria. It is the strongest instrumentally recorded earthquake in Morocco, the deadliest in the country since the 1960 Agadir earthquake, and the second-deadliest earthquake of 2023 after the Turkey–Syria earthquake. A total of over 2.7 million people from Marrakesh and areas surrounding the Atlas Mountains were affected, including 100,000 children.
- On Monday, September 11, 2023 heavy rainfall brought by Storm Daniel caused two dams to burst in the city of Derna, Libya destroying entire neighborhoods as well as major roads and bridges. Officials estimate that over 6,000 people have died while thousands more are missing. Tens of thousands of people have also been displaced and the damage is so severe that there is no prospect of going back home. Years of civil war, corruption and institutional neglect left residents of the North African state at the mercy of Mediterranean storm Daniel's extreme weather. While the water brought death to Derna in a devastating and sudden rush for many residents, the floods were preceded by a litany of unheeded warnings. But years went by as cautionary reports piled up and restoration efforts either failed to get off the ground or were

abandoned in the chaos of civil war. And all of it only highlights a glaring issue facing the world: The effects of climate change are making acute weather phenomena like Daniel more frequent, placing additional stress on flawed structures — and states. Climate change is increasing weather extremes, stresses infrastructure and makes management and preparation all the more important. Timely prediction of the storm and a response like the swift opening of the dam gates might have helped prevent such a disaster, experts said. But failing to identify the threat to Derna despite all the warnings was the ultimate failing.

- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 520 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of September28th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.
