

### A READING OF THE WORD

#### First Reading: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

The selection of the Hebrew scriptures is from the prophet Zephaniah. Like last week's reading from the prophet Amos, the focus is on the day of YHWH, the day of judgment. Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"
- 4 For in your sight a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.
- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

### 6 In the morning it sprouts, but by evening it has withered and died.

- 7 In the same way, we are consumed terrified by your anger and indignation.
- 8 Our guilt lies open before you; our secrets are revealed in the light of your presence.
- 9 All our days pass away under your anger, and our life is over like a sigh.
- 10 The span of our life is but seventy years perhaps eighty if we're strong but the best of them are nothing but sorrow and pain; they pass swiftly and we are gone.
- 11 Who understands the power of your anger? We fear the strength of your wrath.
- 12 Make us realize how short life is that we may gain wisdom of heart.

### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

25 14 "Again, it's like a wealthy landowner who was going on a journey and called in three workers, entrusting some funds to them. 15 The first was given five talents, the second two talents, and the third one talent, according to each one's ability. Then the landowner went away.
16 Immediately the worker who received the five talents went and invested it and made another five.
17 In the same way, the worker who received the two talents doubled that figure. 18 But the worker who received the two talents doubled that figure. 18 But the worker who received the one talent instead went off and dug a hole in the ground and buried the talent

19 "After a long absence, the traveler returned home and settled accounts with them. 20 The one who had received the five talents came forward bringing the additional five, saying, 'You entrusted me with five talents; here are five talents more.'

21 "The landowner said, 'Well done! You are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

22 "The one who had received the two talents then stepped forward with the additional two, saying, 'You entrusted me with two talents; here are two talents more.'

23 "The landowner said to this one, 'Cleverly done! You too are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

24 "Finally the one who had received the one talent stepped forward and said to the landowner, 'Knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter—25 and fearing your wrath, I went off and buried you're the one talent in the ground. Here is your money back.'

26 "The landowner exclaimed, 'You worthless, lazy lout! So you know that I reap where I don't sow and gather where I don't scatter, do you? 27 All the more reason to deposit my money with the bankers, so that on my return I could have had it back with interest! 28 You, there! Take the one talent away from this bum and give it to the one with the ten talents.

29 "'Those who have will get more until they grow rich, while those who have not will lose even the little they have. 30 Throw this worthless one outside into the darkness, where there is wailing and grinding of teeth.'

- In early August 2023, a series of wildfires broke out in the U.S. state of Hawai'i. Affecting the island of Maui, and to a lesser extent Hawai'i (also known as the Big Island), the wind-driven fires prompted evacuations, caused widespread damage, and killed at least 96 people in the

town of Lahaina. The proliferation of the wildfires was attributed to dry, gusty conditions created by a strong high-pressure area north of Hawaii and Hurricane Dora to the south. By August 9, the state government of Hawaii issued a state of emergency for the entirety of the state. On August 10, President Biden issued a federal major disaster declaration. The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.


- Hundreds of wildfires are burning in the Appalachians amid growing drought. Fires have erupted from Virginia to Georgia, including 80 in West Virginia.
- Gaza is ruled by Hamas, an Islamist militant group that is committed to the destruction of Israel and is designated as a terrorist group by the US and many other powers. Hamas launched an unprecedented assault on Israel on Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 with hundreds of gunmen infiltrating communities near the Gaza Strip. At least 1,200 Israelis have been killed, while around 250 soldiers and civilians, including women and children, are being held in Gaza as hostages. More than 11,000 Palestinians have also been killed in numerous air strikes on Gaza that Israel's military is carrying out in response, and Israel has imposed a total blockade on the territory, denying it food, fuel, water, and other essentials. In addition to ongoing air strikes Israel has followed up with a ground invasion of Gaza. There is a significant and growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza.
- Two significant earthquakes jolted Nepal on Monday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, just three days after a powerful temblor killed more than 150 people in the Himalayan nation. A magnitude 5.2 earthquake struck Nepal on Monday, centered in the Jajarkot district about 250 miles northeast of the capital, Kathmandu, which was hit hard by the magnitude 5.6 earthquake on Friday. At least 153 people were killed by that first quake, according to the latest official figures from Nepalese authorities on Monday, which was a slightly lower toll than provided over the weekend. More than 339 people were also injured.
- The people of Lewiston, Maine and surrounding communities following a mass shooting at two locations on October 25<sup>th</sup> that took the lives of 18 people and injured 13 other people.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 603 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of November 15th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.

### A READING OF THE WORD

#### First Reading: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

The selection of the Hebrew scriptures is from the prophet Zephaniah. Like last week's reading from the prophet Amos, the focus is on the day of YHWH, the day of judgment. Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"
- 4 For in your sight a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.
- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

### 6 In the morning it sprouts, but by evening it has withered and died.

- 7 In the same way, we are consumed terrified by your anger and indignation.
- 8 Our guilt lies open before you; our secrets are revealed in the light of your presence.
- 9 All our days pass away under your anger, and our life is over like a sigh.
- 10 The span of our life is but seventy years perhaps eighty if we're strong but the best of them are nothing but sorrow and pain; they pass swiftly and we are gone.
- 11 Who understands the power of your anger? We fear the strength of your wrath.
- 12 Make us realize how short life is that we may gain wisdom of heart.

### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

25 14 "Again, it's like a wealthy landowner who was going on a journey and called in three workers, entrusting some funds to them. 15 The first was given five talents, the second two talents, and the third one talent, according to each one's ability. Then the landowner went away.
16 Immediately the worker who received the five talents went and invested it and made another five.
17 In the same way, the worker who received the two talents doubled that figure. 18 But the worker who received the two talents doubled that figure. 18 But the worker who received the one talent instead went off and dug a hole in the ground and buried the talent

19 "After a long absence, the traveler returned home and settled accounts with them. 20 The one who had received the five talents came forward bringing the additional five, saying, 'You entrusted me with five talents; here are five talents more.'

21 "The landowner said, 'Well done! You are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

22 "The one who had received the two talents then stepped forward with the additional two, saying, 'You entrusted me with two talents; here are two talents more.'

23 "The landowner said to this one, 'Cleverly done! You too are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

24 "Finally the one who had received the one talent stepped forward and said to the landowner, 'Knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter—25 and fearing your wrath, I went off and buried you're the one talent in the ground. Here is your money back.'

26 "The landowner exclaimed, 'You worthless, lazy lout! So you know that I reap where I don't sow and gather where I don't scatter, do you? 27 All the more reason to deposit my money with the bankers, so that on my return I could have had it back with interest! 28 You, there! Take the one talent away from this bum and give it to the one with the ten talents.

29 "'Those who have will get more until they grow rich, while those who have not will lose even the little they have. 30 Throw this worthless one outside into the darkness, where there is wailing and grinding of teeth.'

- In early August 2023, a series of wildfires broke out in the U.S. state of Hawai'i. Affecting the island of Maui, and to a lesser extent Hawai'i (also known as the Big Island), the wind-driven fires prompted evacuations, caused widespread damage, and killed at least 96 people in the

town of Lahaina. The proliferation of the wildfires was attributed to dry, gusty conditions created by a strong high-pressure area north of Hawaii and Hurricane Dora to the south. By August 9, the state government of Hawaii issued a state of emergency for the entirety of the state. On August 10, President Biden issued a federal major disaster declaration. The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.


- Hundreds of wildfires are burning in the Appalachians amid growing drought. Fires have erupted from Virginia to Georgia, including 80 in West Virginia.
- Gaza is ruled by Hamas, an Islamist militant group that is committed to the destruction of Israel and is designated as a terrorist group by the US and many other powers. Hamas launched an unprecedented assault on Israel on Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 with hundreds of gunmen infiltrating communities near the Gaza Strip. At least 1,200 Israelis have been killed, while around 250 soldiers and civilians, including women and children, are being held in Gaza as hostages. More than 11,000 Palestinians have also been killed in numerous air strikes on Gaza that Israel's military is carrying out in response, and Israel has imposed a total blockade on the territory, denying it food, fuel, water, and other essentials. In addition to ongoing air strikes Israel has followed up with a ground invasion of Gaza. There is a significant and growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza.
- Two significant earthquakes jolted Nepal on Monday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, just three days after a powerful temblor killed more than 150 people in the Himalayan nation. A magnitude 5.2 earthquake struck Nepal on Monday, centered in the Jajarkot district about 250 miles northeast of the capital, Kathmandu, which was hit hard by the magnitude 5.6 earthquake on Friday. At least 153 people were killed by that first quake, according to the latest official figures from Nepalese authorities on Monday, which was a slightly lower toll than provided over the weekend. More than 339 people were also injured.
- The people of Lewiston, Maine and surrounding communities following a mass shooting at two locations on October 25<sup>th</sup> that took the lives of 18 people and injured 13 other people.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 603 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of November 15th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.

### A READING OF THE WORD

#### First Reading: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

The selection of the Hebrew scriptures is from the prophet Zephaniah. Like last week's reading from the prophet Amos, the focus is on the day of YHWH, the day of judgment. Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"
- 4 For in your sight a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.
- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

### 6 In the morning it sprouts, but by evening it has withered and died.

- 7 In the same way, we are consumed terrified by your anger and indignation.
- 8 Our guilt lies open before you; our secrets are revealed in the light of your presence.
- 9 All our days pass away under your anger, and our life is over like a sigh.
- 10 The span of our life is but seventy years perhaps eighty if we're strong but the best of them are nothing but sorrow and pain; they pass swiftly and we are gone.
- 11 Who understands the power of your anger? We fear the strength of your wrath.
- 12 Make us realize how short life is that we may gain wisdom of heart.

### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

25 14 "Again, it's like a wealthy landowner who was going on a journey and called in three workers, entrusting some funds to them. 15 The first was given five talents, the second two talents, and the third one talent, according to each one's ability. Then the landowner went away.
16 Immediately the worker who received the five talents went and invested it and made another five.
17 In the same way, the worker who received the two talents doubled that figure. 18 But the worker who received the two talents doubled that figure. 18 But the worker who received the one talent instead went off and dug a hole in the ground and buried the talent

19 "After a long absence, the traveler returned home and settled accounts with them. 20 The one who had received the five talents came forward bringing the additional five, saying, 'You entrusted me with five talents; here are five talents more.'

21 "The landowner said, 'Well done! You are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

22 "The one who had received the two talents then stepped forward with the additional two, saying, 'You entrusted me with two talents; here are two talents more.'

23 "The landowner said to this one, 'Cleverly done! You too are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

24 "Finally the one who had received the one talent stepped forward and said to the landowner, 'Knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter—25 and fearing your wrath, I went off and buried you're the one talent in the ground. Here is your money back.'

26 "The landowner exclaimed, 'You worthless, lazy lout! So you know that I reap where I don't sow and gather where I don't scatter, do you? 27 All the more reason to deposit my money with the bankers, so that on my return I could have had it back with interest! 28 You, there! Take the one talent away from this bum and give it to the one with the ten talents.

29 "'Those who have will get more until they grow rich, while those who have not will lose even the little they have. 30 Throw this worthless one outside into the darkness, where there is wailing and grinding of teeth.'

- In early August 2023, a series of wildfires broke out in the U.S. state of Hawai'i. Affecting the island of Maui, and to a lesser extent Hawai'i (also known as the Big Island), the wind-driven fires prompted evacuations, caused widespread damage, and killed at least 96 people in the

town of Lahaina. The proliferation of the wildfires was attributed to dry, gusty conditions created by a strong high-pressure area north of Hawaii and Hurricane Dora to the south. By August 9, the state government of Hawaii issued a state of emergency for the entirety of the state. On August 10, President Biden issued a federal major disaster declaration. The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.


- Hundreds of wildfires are burning in the Appalachians amid growing drought. Fires have erupted from Virginia to Georgia, including 80 in West Virginia.
- Gaza is ruled by Hamas, an Islamist militant group that is committed to the destruction of Israel and is designated as a terrorist group by the US and many other powers. Hamas launched an unprecedented assault on Israel on Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 with hundreds of gunmen infiltrating communities near the Gaza Strip. At least 1,200 Israelis have been killed, while around 250 soldiers and civilians, including women and children, are being held in Gaza as hostages. More than 11,000 Palestinians have also been killed in numerous air strikes on Gaza that Israel's military is carrying out in response, and Israel has imposed a total blockade on the territory, denying it food, fuel, water, and other essentials. In addition to ongoing air strikes Israel has followed up with a ground invasion of Gaza. There is a significant and growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza.
- Two significant earthquakes jolted Nepal on Monday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, just three days after a powerful temblor killed more than 150 people in the Himalayan nation. A magnitude 5.2 earthquake struck Nepal on Monday, centered in the Jajarkot district about 250 miles northeast of the capital, Kathmandu, which was hit hard by the magnitude 5.6 earthquake on Friday. At least 153 people were killed by that first quake, according to the latest official figures from Nepalese authorities on Monday, which was a slightly lower toll than provided over the weekend. More than 339 people were also injured.
- The people of Lewiston, Maine and surrounding communities following a mass shooting at two locations on October 25<sup>th</sup> that took the lives of 18 people and injured 13 other people.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 603 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of November 15th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.

Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"
- 4 For in your sight a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.
- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

#### 6 In the morning it sprouts, but by evening it has withered and died.

- 7 In the same way, we are consumed terrified by your anger and indignation.
- 8 Our guilt lies open before you; our secrets are revealed in the light of your presence.
- 9 All our days pass away under your anger, and our life is over like a sigh.
- 10 The span of our life is but seventy years perhaps eighty if we're strong but the best of them are nothing but sorrow and pain; they pass swiftly and we are gone.
- 11 Who understands the power of your anger? We fear the strength of your wrath.
- 12 Make us realize how short life is that we may gain wisdom of heart.

#### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

25 14 "Again, it's like a wealthy landowner who was going on a journey and called in three workers, entrusting some funds to them. 15 The first was given five talents, the second two talents, and the third one talent, according to each one's ability. Then the landowner went away.
16 Immediately the worker who received the five talents went and invested it and made another five.
17 In the same way, the worker who received the two talents doubled that figure. 18 But the worker who received the two talents doubled that figure. 18 But the worker who received the one talent instead went off and dug a hole in the ground and buried the talent

19 "After a long absence, the traveler returned home and settled accounts with them. 20 The one who had received the five talents came forward bringing the additional five, saying, 'You entrusted me with five talents; here are five talents more.'

21 "The landowner said, 'Well done! You are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

22 "The one who had received the two talents then stepped forward with the additional two, saying, 'You entrusted me with two talents; here are two talents more.'

23 "The landowner said to this one, 'Cleverly done! You too are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

24 "Finally the one who had received the one talent stepped forward and said to the landowner, 'Knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter—25 and fearing your wrath, I went off and buried you're the one talent in the ground. Here is your money back.'

26 "The landowner exclaimed, 'You worthless, lazy lout! So you know that I reap where I don't sow and gather where I don't scatter, do you? 27 All the more reason to deposit my money with the bankers, so that on my return I could have had it back with interest! 28 You, there! Take the one talent away from this bum and give it to the one with the ten talents.

29 "'Those who have will get more until they grow rich, while those who have not will lose even the little they have. 30 Throw this worthless one outside into the darkness, where there is wailing and grinding of teeth.'

- In early August 2023, a series of wildfires broke out in the U.S. state of Hawai'i. Affecting the island of Maui, and to a lesser extent Hawai'i (also known as the Big Island), the wind-driven fires prompted evacuations, caused widespread damage, and killed at least 96 people in the

town of Lahaina. The proliferation of the wildfires was attributed to dry, gusty conditions created by a strong high-pressure area north of Hawaii and Hurricane Dora to the south. By August 9, the state government of Hawaii issued a state of emergency for the entirety of the state. On August 10, President Biden issued a federal major disaster declaration. The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.


- Hundreds of wildfires are burning in the Appalachians amid growing drought. Fires have erupted from Virginia to Georgia, including 80 in West Virginia.
- Gaza is ruled by Hamas, an Islamist militant group that is committed to the destruction of Israel and is designated as a terrorist group by the US and many other powers. Hamas launched an unprecedented assault on Israel on Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 with hundreds of gunmen infiltrating communities near the Gaza Strip. At least 1,200 Israelis have been killed, while around 250 soldiers and civilians, including women and children, are being held in Gaza as hostages. More than 11,000 Palestinians have also been killed in numerous air strikes on Gaza that Israel's military is carrying out in response, and Israel has imposed a total blockade on the territory, denying it food, fuel, water, and other essentials. In addition to ongoing air strikes Israel has followed up with a ground invasion of Gaza. There is a significant and growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza.
- Two significant earthquakes jolted Nepal on Monday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, just three days after a powerful temblor killed more than 150 people in the Himalayan nation. A magnitude 5.2 earthquake struck Nepal on Monday, centered in the Jajarkot district about 250 miles northeast of the capital, Kathmandu, which was hit hard by the magnitude 5.6 earthquake on Friday. At least 153 people were killed by that first quake, according to the latest official figures from Nepalese authorities on Monday, which was a slightly lower toll than provided over the weekend. More than 339 people were also injured.
- The people of Lewiston, Maine and surrounding communities following a mass shooting at two locations on October 25<sup>th</sup> that took the lives of 18 people and injured 13 other people.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 603 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of November 15th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.

This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"
- 4 For in your sight a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.
- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

- 11 Who understands the power of your anger? We fear the strength of your wrath.
- 12 Make us realize how short life is that we may gain wisdom of heart.

#### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

25 14 "Again, it's like a wealthy landowner who was going on a journey and called in three workers, entrusting some funds to them. 15 The first was given five talents, the second two talents, and the third one talent, according to each one's ability. Then the landowner went away.

The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.


- Hundreds of wildfires are burning in the Appalachians amid growing drought. Fires have erupted from Virginia to Georgia, including 80 in West Virginia.
- Gaza is ruled by Hamas, an Islamist militant group that is committed to the destruction of Israel and is designated as a terrorist group by the US and many other powers. Hamas launched an unprecedented assault on Israel on Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 with hundreds of gunmen infiltrating communities near the Gaza Strip. At least 1,200 Israelis have been killed, while around 250 soldiers and civilians, including women and children, are being held in Gaza as hostages. More than 11,000 Palestinians have also been killed in numerous air strikes on Gaza that Israel's military is carrying out in response, and Israel has imposed a total blockade on the territory, denying it food, fuel, water, and other essentials. In addition to ongoing air strikes Israel has followed up with a ground invasion of Gaza. There is a significant and growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza.
- Two significant earthquakes jolted Nepal on Monday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, just three days after a powerful temblor killed more than 150 people in the Himalayan nation. A magnitude 5.2 earthquake struck Nepal on Monday, centered in the Jajarkot district about 250 miles northeast of the capital, Kathmandu, which was hit hard by the magnitude 5.6 earthquake on Friday. At least 153 people were killed by that first quake, according to the latest official figures from Nepalese authorities on Monday, which was a slightly lower toll than provided over the weekend. More than 339 people were also injured.
- The people of Lewiston, Maine and surrounding communities following a mass shooting at two locations on October 25<sup>th</sup> that took the lives of 18 people and injured 13 other people.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 603 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of November 15th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.

### A READING OF THE WORD

### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

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

### A READING OF THE WORD

#### First Reading: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

The selection of the Hebrew scriptures is from the prophet Zephaniah. Like last week's reading from the prophet Amos, the focus is on the day of YHWH, the day of judgment. Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. #### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."



### A READING OF THE WORD

#### First Reading: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

The selection of the Hebrew scriptures is from the prophet Zephaniah. Like last week's reading from the prophet Amos, the focus is on the day of YHWH, the day of judgment. Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"
- 4 For in your sight a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.
- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

### 6 In the morning it sprouts, but by evening it has withered and died.

- 7 In the same way, we are consumed terrified by your anger and indignation.
- 8 Our guilt lies open before you; our secrets are revealed in the light of your presence.
- 9 All our days pass away under your anger, and our life is over like a sigh.
- 10 The span of our life is but seventy years perhaps eighty if we're strong but the best of them are nothing but sorrow and pain; they pass swiftly and we are gone.
- 11 Who understands the power of your anger? We fear the strength of your wrath.
- 12 Make us realize how short life is that we may gain wisdom of heart.

### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

25 14 "Again, it's like a wealthy landowner who was going on a journey and called in three workers, entrusting some funds to them. 15 The first was given five talents, the second two talents, and the third one talent, according to each one's ability. Then the landowner went away.
16 Immediately the worker who received the five talents went and invested it and made another five.
17 In the same way, the worker who received the two talents doubled that figure. 18 But the worker who received the two talents doubled that figure. 18 But the worker who received the one talent instead went off and dug a hole in the ground and buried the talent

22 "The one who had received the two talents then stepped forward with the additional two, saying, 'You entrusted me with two talents; here are two talents more.'

23 "The landowner said to this one, 'Cleverly done! You too are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

24 "Finally the one who had received the one talent stepped forward and said to the landowner, 'Knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter—25 and fearing your wrath, I went off and buried you're the one talent in the ground. Here is your money back.'

26 "The landowner exclaimed, 'You worthless, lazy lout! So you know that I reap where I don't sow and gather where I don't scatter, do you? 27 All the more reason to deposit my money with the bankers, so that on my return I could have had it back with interest! 28 You, there! Take the one talent away from this bum and give it to the one with the ten talents.

29 "'Those who have will get more until they grow rich, while those who have not will lose even the little they have. 30 Throw this worthless one outside into the darkness, where there is wailing and grinding of teeth.'

- In early August 2023, a series of wildfires broke out in the U.S. state of Hawai'i. Affecting the island of Maui, and to a lesser extent Hawai'i (also known as the Big Island), the wind-driven fires prompted evacuations, caused widespread damage, and killed at least 96 people in the

town of Lahaina. The proliferation of the wildfires was attributed to dry, gusty conditions created by a strong high-pressure area north of Hawaii and Hurricane Dora to the south. By August 9, the state government of Hawaii issued a state of emergency for the entirety of the state. On August 10, President Biden issued a federal major disaster declaration. The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.


- Hundreds of wildfires are burning in the Appalachians amid growing drought. Fires have erupted from Virginia to Georgia, including 80 in West Virginia.
- Gaza is ruled by Hamas, an Islamist militant group that is committed to the destruction of Israel and is designated as a terrorist group by the US and many other powers. Hamas launched an unprecedented assault on Israel on Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 with hundreds of gunmen infiltrating communities near the Gaza Strip. At least 1,200 Israelis have been killed, while around 250 soldiers and civilians, including women and children, are being held in Gaza as hostages. More than 11,000 Palestinians have also been killed in numerous air strikes on Gaza that Israel's military is carrying out in response, and Israel has imposed a total blockade on the territory, denying it food, fuel, water, and other essentials. In addition to ongoing air strikes Israel has followed up with a ground invasion of Gaza. There is a significant and growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza.
- Two significant earthquakes jolted Nepal on Monday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, just three days after a powerful temblor killed more than 150 people in the Himalayan nation. A magnitude 5.2 earthquake struck Nepal on Monday, centered in the Jajarkot district about 250 miles northeast of the capital, Kathmandu, which was hit hard by the magnitude 5.6 earthquake on Friday. At least 153 people were killed by that first quake, according to the latest official figures from Nepalese authorities on Monday, which was a slightly lower toll than provided over the weekend. More than 339 people were also injured.
- The people of Lewiston, Maine and surrounding communities following a mass shooting at two locations on October 25<sup>th</sup> that took the lives of 18 people and injured 13 other people.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 603 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of November 15th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.
- For those affected by the coronavirus COVID-19 pandemic and the various variant surges: for all those who are infected and/or sick, and those who are grieving, for all who are affected, all around the world, for essential workers and frontline workers...we pray for comfort, for safety, for health and for wholeness.

#### A READING OF THE WORD

#### First Reading: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

The selection of the Hebrew scriptures is from the prophet Zephaniah. Like last week's reading from the prophet Amos, the focus is on the day of YHWH, the day of judgment. Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"
- 4 For in your sight a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.
- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

#### 6 In the morning it sprouts, but by evening it has withered and died.

- 7 In the same way, we are consumed terrified by your anger and indignation.
- 8 Our guilt lies open before you; our secrets are revealed in the light of your presence.
- 9 All our days pass away under your anger, and our life is over like a sigh.
- 10 The span of our life is but seventy years perhaps eighty if we're strong but the best of them are nothing but sorrow and pain; they pass swiftly and we are gone.
- 11 Who understands the power of your anger? We fear the strength of your wrath.
- 12 Make us realize how short life is that we may gain wisdom of heart.

#### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

25 14 "Again, it's like a wealthy landowner who was going on a journey and called in three workers, entrusting some funds to them. 15 The first was given five talents, the second two talents, and the third one talent, according to each one's ability. Then the landowner went away.
16 Immediately the worker who received the five talents went and invested it and made another five.

22 "The one who had received the two talents then stepped forward with the additional two, saying, 'You entrusted me with two talents; here are two talents more.'

23 "The landowner said to this one, 'Cleverly done! You too are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

24 "Finally the one who had received the one talent stepped forward and said to the landowner, 'Knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter—25 and fearing your wrath, I went off and buried you're the one talent in the ground. Here is your money back.'

26 "The landowner exclaimed, 'You worthless, lazy lout! So you know that I reap where I don't sow and gather where I don't scatter, do you? 27 All the more reason to deposit my money with the bankers, so that on my return I could have had it back with interest! 28 You, there! Take the one talent away from this bum and give it to the one with the ten talents.

29 "'Those who have will get more until they grow rich, while those who have not will lose even the little they have. 30 Throw this worthless one outside into the darkness, where there is wailing and grinding of teeth.'

- In early August 2023, a series of wildfires broke out in the U.S. state of Hawai'i. Affecting the island of Maui, and to a lesser extent Hawai'i (also known as the Big Island), the wind-driven fires prompted evacuations, caused widespread damage, and killed at least 96 people in the

town of Lahaina. The proliferation of the wildfires was attributed to dry, gusty conditions created by a strong high-pressure area north of Hawaii and Hurricane Dora to the south. By August 9, the state government of Hawaii issued a state of emergency for the entirety of the state. On August 10, President Biden issued a federal major disaster declaration. The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.


- Hundreds of wildfires are burning in the Appalachians amid growing drought. Fires have erupted from Virginia to Georgia, including 80 in West Virginia.
- Gaza is ruled by Hamas, an Islamist militant group that is committed to the destruction of Israel and is designated as a terrorist group by the US and many other powers. Hamas launched an unprecedented assault on Israel on Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 with hundreds of gunmen infiltrating communities near the Gaza Strip. At least 1,200 Israelis have been killed, while around 250 soldiers and civilians, including women and children, are being held in Gaza as hostages. More than 11,000 Palestinians have also been killed in numerous air strikes on Gaza that Israel's military is carrying out in response, and Israel has imposed a total blockade on the territory, denying it food, fuel, water, and other essentials. In addition to ongoing air strikes Israel has followed up with a ground invasion of Gaza. There is a significant and growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza.
- Two significant earthquakes jolted Nepal on Monday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, just three days after a powerful temblor killed more than 150 people in the Himalayan nation. A magnitude 5.2 earthquake struck Nepal on Monday, centered in the Jajarkot district about 250 miles northeast of the capital, Kathmandu, which was hit hard by the magnitude 5.6 earthquake on Friday. At least 153 people were killed by that first quake, according to the latest official figures from Nepalese authorities on Monday, which was a slightly lower toll than provided over the weekend. More than 339 people were also injured.
- The people of Lewiston, Maine and surrounding communities following a mass shooting at two locations on October 25<sup>th</sup> that took the lives of 18 people and injured 13 other people.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 603 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of November 15th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.
- For those affected by the coronavirus COVID-19 pandemic and the various variant surges: for all those who are infected and/or sick, and those who are grieving, for all who are affected, all around the world, for essential workers and frontline workers...we pray for comfort, for safety, for health and for wholeness.

#### A READING OF THE WORD

#### First Reading: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

The selection of the Hebrew scriptures is from the prophet Zephaniah. Like last week's reading from the prophet Amos, the focus is on the day of YHWH, the day of judgment. Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"
- 4 For in your sight a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.
- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

#### 6 In the morning it sprouts, but by evening it has withered and died.

- 7 In the same way, we are consumed terrified by your anger and indignation.
- 8 Our guilt lies open before you; our secrets are revealed in the light of your presence.
- 9 All our days pass away under your anger, and our life is over like a sigh.
- 10 The span of our life is but seventy years perhaps eighty if we're strong but the best of them are nothing but sorrow and pain; they pass swiftly and we are gone.
- 11 Who understands the power of your anger? We fear the strength of your wrath.
- 12 Make us realize how short life is that we may gain wisdom of heart.

#### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

25 14 "Again, it's like a wealthy landowner who was going on a journey and called in three workers, entrusting some funds to them. 15 The first was given five talents, the second two talents, and the third one talent, according to each one's ability. Then the landowner went away.
16 Immediately the worker who received the five talents went and invested it and made another five.

21 "The landowner said, 'Well done! You are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

22 "The one who had received the two talents then stepped forward with the additional two, saying, 'You entrusted me with two talents; here are two talents more.'

23 "The landowner said to this one, 'Cleverly done! You too are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

24 "Finally the one who had received the one talent stepped forward and said to the landowner, 'Knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter—25 and fearing your wrath, I went off and buried you're the one talent in the ground. Here is your money back.'

26 "The landowner exclaimed, 'You worthless, lazy lout! So you know that I reap where I don't sow and gather where I don't scatter, do you? 27 All the more reason to deposit my money with the bankers, so that on my return I could have had it back with interest! 28 You, there! Take the one talent away from this bum and give it to the one with the ten talents.

29 "'Those who have will get more until they grow rich, while those who have not will lose even the little they have. 30 Throw this worthless one outside into the darkness, where there is wailing and grinding of teeth.'

- In early August 2023, a series of wildfires broke out in the U.S. state of Hawai'i. Affecting the island of Maui, and to a lesser extent Hawai'i (also known as the Big Island), the wind-driven fires prompted evacuations, caused widespread damage, and killed at least 96 people in the

town of Lahaina. The proliferation of the wildfires was attributed to dry, gusty conditions created by a strong high-pressure area north of Hawaii and Hurricane Dora to the south. By August 9, the state government of Hawaii issued a state of emergency for the entirety of the state. On August 10, President Biden issued a federal major disaster declaration. The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.


- Hundreds of wildfires are burning in the Appalachians amid growing drought. Fires have erupted from Virginia to Georgia, including 80 in West Virginia.
- Gaza is ruled by Hamas, an Islamist militant group that is committed to the destruction of Israel and is designated as a terrorist group by the US and many other powers. Hamas launched an unprecedented assault on Israel on Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 with hundreds of gunmen infiltrating communities near the Gaza Strip. At least 1,200 Israelis have been killed, while around 250 soldiers and civilians, including women and children, are being held in Gaza as hostages. More than 11,000 Palestinians have also been killed in numerous air strikes on Gaza that Israel's military is carrying out in response, and Israel has imposed a total blockade on the territory, denying it food, fuel, water, and other essentials. In addition to ongoing air strikes Israel has followed up with a ground invasion of Gaza. There is a significant and growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza.
- Two significant earthquakes jolted Nepal on Monday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, just three days after a powerful temblor killed more than 150 people in the Himalayan nation. A magnitude 5.2 earthquake struck Nepal on Monday, centered in the Jajarkot district about 250 miles northeast of the capital, Kathmandu, which was hit hard by the magnitude 5.6 earthquake on Friday. At least 153 people were killed by that first quake, according to the latest official figures from Nepalese authorities on Monday, which was a slightly lower toll than provided over the weekend. More than 339 people were also injured.
- The people of Lewiston, Maine and surrounding communities following a mass shooting at two locations on October 25<sup>th</sup> that took the lives of 18 people and injured 13 other people.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 603 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of November 15th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.
- For those affected by the coronavirus COVID-19 pandemic and the various variant surges: for all those who are infected and/or sick, and those who are grieving, for all who are affected, all around the world, for essential workers and frontline workers...we pray for comfort, for safety, for health and for wholeness.

#### A READING OF THE WORD

#### First Reading: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

The selection of the Hebrew scriptures is from the prophet Zephaniah. Like last week's reading from the prophet Amos, the focus is on the day of YHWH, the day of judgment. Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"
- 4 For in your sight a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.
- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

### 6 In the morning it sprouts, but by evening it has withered and died.

- 7 In the same way, we are consumed terrified by your anger and indignation.
- 8 Our guilt lies open before you; our secrets are revealed in the light of your presence.
- 9 All our days pass away under your anger, and our life is over like a sigh.
- 10 The span of our life is but seventy years perhaps eighty if we're strong but the best of them are nothing but sorrow and pain; they pass swiftly and we are gone.
- 11 Who understands the power of your anger? We fear the strength of your wrath.
- 12 Make us realize how short life is that we may gain wisdom of heart.

### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

25 14 "Again, it's like a wealthy landowner who was going on a journey and called in three workers, entrusting some funds to them. 15 The first was given five talents, the second two talents, and the third one talent, according to each one's ability. Then the landowner went away.
16 Immediately the worker who received the five talents went and invested it and made another five.
17 In the same way, the worker who received the two talents doubled that figure. 18 But the worker who received the two talents doubled that figure. 18 But the worker who received the one talent instead went off and dug a hole in the ground and buried the talent

19 "After a long absence, the traveler returned home and settled accounts with them. 20 The one who had received the five talents came forward bringing the additional five, saying, 'You entrusted me with five talents; here are five talents more.'

21 "The landowner said, 'Well done! You are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

22 "The one who had received the two talents then stepped forward with the additional two, saying, 'You entrusted me with two talents; here are two talents more.'

23 "The landowner said to this one, 'Cleverly done! You too are a good and faithful worker. Since you were dependable in a small matter, I will put you in charge of larger affairs. Come, share my joy!'

24 "Finally the one who had received the one talent stepped forward and said to the landowner, 'Knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter—25 and fearing your wrath, I went off and buried you're the one talent in the ground. Here is your money back.'

26 "The landowner exclaimed, 'You worthless, lazy lout! So you know that I reap where I don't sow and gather where I don't scatter, do you? 27 All the more reason to deposit my money with the bankers, so that on my return I could have had it back with interest! 28 You, there! Take the one talent away from this bum and give it to the one with the ten talents.

29 "'Those who have will get more until they grow rich, while those who have not will lose even the little they have. 30 Throw this worthless one outside into the darkness, where there is wailing and grinding of teeth.'

town of Lahaina. The proliferation of the wildfires was attributed to dry, gusty conditions created by a strong high-pressure area north of Hawaii and Hurricane Dora to the south. By August 9, the state government of Hawaii issued a state of emergency for the entirety of the state. On August 10, President Biden issued a federal major disaster declaration. The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.


- Hundreds of wildfires are burning in the Appalachians amid growing drought. Fires have erupted from Virginia to Georgia, including 80 in West Virginia.
- Gaza is ruled by Hamas, an Islamist militant group that is committed to the destruction of Israel and is designated as a terrorist group by the US and many other powers. Hamas launched an unprecedented assault on Israel on Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 with hundreds of gunmen infiltrating communities near the Gaza Strip. At least 1,200 Israelis have been killed, while around 250 soldiers and civilians, including women and children, are being held in Gaza as hostages. More than 11,000 Palestinians have also been killed in numerous air strikes on Gaza that Israel's military is carrying out in response, and Israel has imposed a total blockade on the territory, denying it food, fuel, water, and other essentials. In addition to ongoing air strikes Israel has followed up with a ground invasion of Gaza. There is a significant and growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza.
- Two significant earthquakes jolted Nepal on Monday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, just three days after a powerful temblor killed more than 150 people in the Himalayan nation. A magnitude 5.2 earthquake struck Nepal on Monday, centered in the Jajarkot district about 250 miles northeast of the capital, Kathmandu, which was hit hard by the magnitude 5.6 earthquake on Friday. At least 153 people were killed by that first quake, according to the latest official figures from Nepalese authorities on Monday, which was a slightly lower toll than provided over the weekend. More than 339 people were also injured.
- The people of Lewiston, Maine and surrounding communities following a mass shooting at two locations on October 25<sup>th</sup> that took the lives of 18 people and injured 13 other people.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 603 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of November 15th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.

### A READING OF THE WORD

#### First Reading: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

The selection of the Hebrew scriptures is from the prophet Zephaniah. Like last week's reading from the prophet Amos, the focus is on the day of YHWH, the day of judgment. Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"
- 4 For in your sight a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.
- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

### 6 In the morning it sprouts, but by evening it has withered and died.

- 7 In the same way, we are consumed terrified by your anger and indignation.
- 8 Our guilt lies open before you; our secrets are revealed in the light of your presence.
- 9 All our days pass away under your anger, and our life is over like a sigh.
- 10 The span of our life is but seventy years perhaps eighty if we're strong but the best of them are nothing but sorrow and pain; they pass swiftly and we are gone.
- 11 Who understands the power of your anger? We fear the strength of your wrath.
- 12 Make us realize how short life is that we may gain wisdom of heart.

### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

25 14 "Again, it's like a wealthy landowner who was going on a journey and called in three workers, entrusting some funds to them. 15 The first was given five talents, the second two talents, and the third one talent, according to each one's ability. Then the landowner went away.



A magnitude 5.2 earthquake struck Nepal on Monday, centered in the Jajarkot district about 250 miles northeast of the capital, Kathmandu, which was hit hard by the magnitude 5.6 earthquake on Friday. At least 153 people were killed by that first quake, according to the latest official figures from Nepalese authorities on Monday, which was a slightly lower toll than provided over the weekend. More than 339 people were also injured.
- The people of Lewiston, Maine and surrounding communities following a mass shooting at two locations on October 25<sup>th</sup> that took the lives of 18 people and injured 13 other people.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 603 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of November 15th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.

### A READING OF THE WORD

#### First Reading: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

The selection of the Hebrew scriptures is from the prophet Zephaniah. Like last week's reading from the prophet Amos, the focus is on the day of YHWH, the day of judgment. Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.

Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"

- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

25 14 "Again, it's like a wealthy landowner who was going on a journey and called in three workers, entrusting some funds to them. 15 The first was given five talents, the second two talents, and the third one talent, according to each one's ability. Then the landowner went away.

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

They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

25 14 "Again, it's like a wealthy landowner who was going on a journey and called in three workers, entrusting some funds to them. 15 The first was given five talents, the second two talents, and the third one talent, according to each one's ability. Then the landowner went away.



### A READING OF THE WORD

#### First Reading: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

The selection of the Hebrew scriptures is from the prophet Zephaniah. Like last week's reading from the prophet Amos, the focus is on the day of YHWH, the day of judgment. Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"
- 4 For in your sight a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.
- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

### 6 In the morning it sprouts, but by evening it has withered and died.

- 7 In the same way, we are consumed terrified by your anger and indignation.
- 8 Our guilt lies open before you; our secrets are revealed in the light of your presence.

- In early August 2023, a series of wildfires broke out in the U.S. state of Hawai'i. Affecting the island of Maui, and to a lesser extent Hawai'i (also known as the Big Island), the wind-driven fires prompted evacuations, caused widespread damage, and killed at least 96 people in the

town of Lahaina. The proliferation of the wildfires was attributed to dry, gusty conditions created by a strong high-pressure area north of Hawaii and Hurricane Dora to the south. By August 9, the state government of Hawaii issued a state of emergency for the entirety of the state. On August 10, President Biden issued a federal major disaster declaration. The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.


- Hundreds of wildfires are burning in the Appalachians amid growing drought. Fires have erupted from Virginia to Georgia, including 80 in West Virginia.
- Gaza is ruled by Hamas, an Islamist militant group that is committed to the destruction of Israel and is designated as a terrorist group by the US and many other powers. Hamas launched an unprecedented assault on Israel on Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 with hundreds of gunmen infiltrating communities near the Gaza Strip. At least 1,200 Israelis have been killed, while around 250 soldiers and civilians, including women and children, are being held in Gaza as hostages. More than 11,000 Palestinians have also been killed in numerous air strikes on Gaza that Israel's military is carrying out in response, and Israel has imposed a total blockade on the territory, denying it food, fuel, water, and other essentials. In addition to ongoing air strikes Israel has followed up with a ground invasion of Gaza. There is a significant and growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza.
- Two significant earthquakes jolted Nepal on Monday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, just three days after a powerful temblor killed more than 150 people in the Himalayan nation. A magnitude 5.2 earthquake struck Nepal on Monday, centered in the Jajarkot district about 250 miles northeast of the capital, Kathmandu, which was hit hard by the magnitude 5.6 earthquake on Friday. At least 153 people were killed by that first quake, according to the latest official figures from Nepalese authorities on Monday, which was a slightly lower toll than provided over the weekend. More than 339 people were also injured.
- The people of Lewiston, Maine and surrounding communities following a mass shooting at two locations on October 25<sup>th</sup> that took the lives of 18 people and injured 13 other people.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 603 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of November 15th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.

### A READING OF THE WORD

#### First Reading: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

The selection of the Hebrew scriptures is from the prophet Zephaniah. Like last week's reading from the prophet Amos, the focus is on the day of YHWH, the day of judgment. Zephaniah was writing during the time of King Josiah, but before he implemented his reforms. For those who are complacent, Zephaniah warns, they will lose everything. They think that God will not allow bad things to happen to them, but they also have not turned back to God's ways. Nothing worldly will be able to save people on the day of YHWH—no money, no power or authority or security measures. The whole earth will be consumed by God's fiery passion. We are reminded that often the use of fire in the Hebrew scriptures refers to purifying, but it doesn't mean a lack of destruction. Everything that is against God's reign will be burned up, and Zephaniah warns that every inhabitant of earth will come to an end. This vision, like the one Amos shared in last week's reading, countered the common view of the prophet's day (and perhaps our own day, in common tropes about the world's end) that only those who are wicked and evil, the enemies of the people, would be destroyed.

- **1** 7 Remain silent in the presence of Sovereign YHWH, for the Day of YHWH is near. YHWH has prepared a sacrifice and set apart those invited.
- 12 When that time comes I will search Jerusalem with lamps,
  and punish those who are complacent in their sin, who say in their hearts,
  "YHWH has no power for good or for evil."
- 13 Their wealth will plundered, their households looted. They will build houses and never live in them, plant vineyards but never drink their own wine.
- 14 The great Day of YHWH is near and coming fast!

How bitter the sound of the Day of YHWH, the day of the warrior's war cry! 15 That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and agony, a day of ruin and of devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, 16 a day of trumpet roar and battle cry against fortified towns and high corner towers. 17 I will bring such distress on the people that they will grope like those who are blind because of their sins against YHWH. Their blood will be poured out like dust and their flesh like dung; 18 neither their gold nor their silver will save them. On the day of YHWH's wrath, in the fire of divine jealousy, all the earth will be consumed. For YHWH intends to destroyyes, destroyall who dwell in the land.

#### Psalm Response: Psalm 90:1-12 (Responsively)

Psalm 90 is a prayer reflecting on God's sovereignty and humanity's fleeting place in the universe. From before anything was created, God existed, and has always been God. Humanity's lifespan is so short, it passes quickly, yet humanity continues to sin and turn away from God. Human life isn't easy—it's mostly hardship—and then we are gone. The psalmist concludes this section with a beautiful statement of treasuring our days, asking God to help us understand how fragile we are, and to count our days in order "that we may gain a wise heart."

- **90** 1 God, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.
- 2 before the mountains were born, you brought forth the earth and the world; you are God without beginning or end.
- 3 You turn humankind back into dust and say: "Go back, creatures of the earth!"
- 4 For in your sight a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.
- 5 You sweep us away like a dream, fleeting as the grass that springs up in the morning—

### 6 In the morning it sprouts, but by evening it has withered and died.

- 7 In the same way, we are consumed terrified by your anger and indignation.
- 8 Our guilt lies open before you; our secrets are revealed in the light of your presence.
- 9 All our days pass away under your anger, and our life is over like a sigh.
- 10 The span of our life is but seventy years perhaps eighty if we're strong but the best of them are nothing but sorrow and pain; they pass swiftly and we are gone.
- 11 Who understands the power of your anger? We fear the strength of your wrath.
- 12 Make us realize how short life is that we may gain wisdom of heart.

### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Epistle reading concludes its series with these verses in 1 Thessalonians 5. The apostle Paul encourages the church in Thessalonica to be both patient and vigilant as they wait for Christ's return, which Paul believed would happen in his lifetime. The political climate of the Roman Empire was fairly volatile, with violence from within the emperor's family and the political machinations of those in Rome and in the Greek cities. Paul calls for the faithful to remain alert, especially in times when there seems to be peace, because everything can change quickly. They are to be awake and live not in the shadows but in the daylight, where people will see and know them by their actions and values. Paul believes that on the day of judgment, the faithful will be saved through Jesus Christ, so they need to encourage one another and build up each other in the faith.

**5** 1 But as to specific times and eras, sisters and brothers, you don't need me to tell you anything—2 you know very well that the Day of God is coming like a thief in the night. 3 Just when people are saying, "At last we have peace and security," then destruction will fall on them with the suddenness of labor pains, and there will be no escape.

4 But you, sisters and brothers, are not in the dark. The Day of God will not catch you like a thief. 5 No, you are all children of light and children of the day. We don't belong to the darkness or the night. 6 So let's not be asleep as others are—let's be awake and sober! 7 Those who sleep do so at night, and those who get drunk do so at night. 8 But we belong to the day, so let us be sober. Let us put on the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.

9 God has destined us not to suffer wrath, but to receive salvation through our Savior Jesus Christ, 10 who died for us so that, whether awake or asleep, we might live together with Christ. 11 So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you're already doing.

#### Gospel Reading: Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus teaches a parable commonly known as the Parable of the Talents in these verses of Matthew 25. In this parable, a landowner went on a journey and summoned workers, entrusting them each with money worth several year's wages. The one who was entrusted with five talents invested them and made five talents more, the one who was entrusted with two talents invested themt and made two talents more, but the one who was given one talent dug a hole and hid it. The story tells us that each were entrusted according to their ability. But when the landowner returned, the worker who had hidden the one talent said, "knowing your ruthlessness—you who reap where you did not sow and gather where you did not scatter." That worker had the one talent taken from them to be given to the one who made ten talents, and the worker was thrown into the outer darkness. On the surface level of the parable, it may appear to be about faithfulness during a temporary absence. How do we use what God has given us in our lifetime? Are we worried about saving our own lives, or are we participating in the reign of God here and now? One could also say the parable teaches us that if we are not willing to risk, we are bound to lose. But the parable never equates the landowner with God. The parable doesn't even begin with "the kindom of heaven is like ..." So perhaps we should not assume this is about the kindom of heaven, but rather, it could be about what happens when you resist worldly power and authorities. It costs to resist. Can you live with integrity when you resist evil? Can you face the judgment of others when you refuse to play by the rules of the world? Others will try to play the game and make more money and move up the ladder of worldly success, but at what cost, when we fail to live into God's ways?

- In early August 2023, a series of wildfires broke out in the U.S. state of Hawai'i. Affecting the island of Maui, and to a lesser extent Hawai'i (also known as the Big Island), the wind-driven fires prompted evacuations, caused widespread damage, and killed at least 96 people in the

town of Lahaina. The proliferation of the wildfires was attributed to dry, gusty conditions created by a strong high-pressure area north of Hawaii and Hurricane Dora to the south. By August 9, the state government of Hawaii issued a state of emergency for the entirety of the state. On August 10, President Biden issued a federal major disaster declaration. The typical area burned by wildfires in Hawaii has increased in recent decades, almost quadrupling. Experts blame the increase on the spread of non-native vegetation and hotter, drier weather.

- Hundreds of wildfires are burning in the Appalachians amid growing drought. Fires have erupted from Virginia to Georgia, including 80 in West Virginia.
- Gaza is ruled by Hamas, an Islamist militant group that is committed to the destruction of Israel and is designated as a terrorist group by the US and many other powers. Hamas launched an unprecedented assault on Israel on Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 with hundreds of gunmen infiltrating communities near the Gaza Strip. At least 1,200 Israelis have been killed, while around 250 soldiers and civilians, including women and children, are being held in Gaza as hostages. More than 11,000 Palestinians have also been killed in numerous air strikes on Gaza that Israel's military is carrying out in response, and Israel has imposed a total blockade on the territory, denying it food, fuel, water, and other essentials. In addition to ongoing air strikes Israel has followed up with a ground invasion of Gaza. There is a significant and growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza.
- Two significant earthquakes jolted Nepal on Monday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, just three days after a powerful temblor killed more than 150 people in the Himalayan nation. A magnitude 5.2 earthquake struck Nepal on Monday, centered in the Jajarkot district about 250 miles northeast of the capital, Kathmandu, which was hit hard by the magnitude 5.6 earthquake on Friday. At least 153 people were killed by that first quake, according to the latest official figures from Nepalese authorities on Monday, which was a slightly lower toll than provided over the weekend. More than 339 people were also injured.
- The people of Lewiston, Maine and surrounding communities following a mass shooting at two locations on October 25<sup>th</sup> that took the lives of 18 people and injured 13 other people.
- According to data from the Gun Violence Archive a total of 603 mass shooting incidents have occurred in the US as of November 15th, 2023. In 2022 a total of 648 mass shootings. In 2021 a total of 693 mass shooting incident occurred across the US, in 2020 a total of 611, in 2019 a total of 417, with 337 incidents in 2018. While we pray for the families and friends of those whose lives have been taken in violent acts and we pray for those injured in body, mind, soul, and spirit—and for their neighborhoods and communities across the United States We know that our words and prayers are not enough. We must repent for our collective inaction and commit to tirelessly working toward meaningful gun violence prevention.
