A READING OF THE WORD

First Reading Acts 4:5-12

The selection in Acts is a continuation of the same story from last Sunday. Peter and John, after healing a person who used to beg at the temple gate, and after speaking to the people at Solomon's Portico on the east side of the temple after that miracle, were arrested and held until the next day. They came before the high priest and his family and were questioned by them about the healing miracle. Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, spoke to all assembled, recognizing that he and John were arrested because they did something good. He answered their question about the power behind the miracle: the person who used to beg stood before them was healed by the name of Jesus Christ, the one crucified and now raised from the dead. Peter concluded with quoting Psalm 118:22, which Jesus quoted when he was questioned in the temple, and Peter declared salvation is found in no other name.

4 5 When the leaders, the elders and the scribes met the next day in Jerusalem, 6 Annas the high priest, Caiaphas, Jochanan, Alexander and all who were of the high priestly class were there. 7 They brought Peter and John before them and began to interrogate them: "By what power and in whose name have you done this?"

8 Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, spoke up: "Leaders of the people! Elders! 9 If we must answer today for a good deed done to a person who was unable to walk, and explain how this person

has been made whole, 10 then you and all the people of Israel must realize that it was done in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified and whom God raised from the dead. In the power of that Name, this person stands before you perfectly sound. 11 This Jesus is 'the stone rejected by the builders which has become the cornerstone.' 12 There is no salvation in anyone else, for there is no other name under heaven given to the human race by which we must be saved."

*Psalm Response: Psalm 23 (Responsively)

The shepherd's psalm of Psalm 23 has long been attributed to king David and understood as a song of comfort in the face of death. God is the shepherd who leads the faithful, the sheep, to safety and security, restoring those who are downtrodden. Even in the face of death (the valley of the shadow), the shepherd comforts the sheep, their rod and staff are there for protection and assurance. Switching metaphors, the psalmist understands God as the one who justifies those who have been wronged, preparing a banquet table and anointing the faithful before their enemies. The psalm concludes with a blessing of goodness and mercy for all the life of the faithful, and that they will live with God forever. This psalm might also be used for Earth Sunday, in thinking of the Good Shepherd and how God cares for all of creation and provides for us good, green spaces and still, clean water.

- **23** 1 YHWH, you are my shepherd— I want nothing more.
- 2 You let me lie down in green meadows; you lead me beside restful waters:
- 3 you refresh my soul. You guide me to lush pastures for the sake of your Name.
- 4 Even if I'm surrounded by shadows of Death,
 I fear no danger, for you are with me. Your rod and your staff—
 they give me courage.
- 5 You spread a table for me in the presence of my enemies, and you anoint my head with oil—my cup overflows!
- 6 Only goodness and mercy will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in your house, YHWH, for days without end.

Second Reading: 1 John 3:16-24

This section of 1 John 3 echoes John 15:12-13, that one who loves lays down their life for their friends. There is no greater love than this, for Christ laid down his life for us. Love must be lived out, to meet the needs of others. Lived-out love is greater than words. Our hearts will let us know when we've let down one another, but God is greater than our hearts and knows everything. God will forgive us and restore us to the work of loving one another. For the commandment that the faithful must obey

is to believe in Jesus Christ, and to love one another.

3 16 This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ died for us. And we, too, ought to lay down our lives for our sisters and brothers. 17 If you have more than enough material possessions and see your neighbors in need yet close your hearts to them, how can the love of God be living in you? 18 My children, our love must not be simply words or mere talk—it must be true love, which shows itself in action and truth. 19 This, then, is how we'll know we belong to the truth; this is how we'll be confident in God's presence, 20 even if our consciences condemn us. We know that God is greater than our consciences and that God knows everything. 21 And if our consciences do not condemn us, my friends, then we have confidence before God, 22 and we will receive whatever we ask from God's hand—because we keep the commandments and do what is pleasing in God's sight

23 The commandments are these: that we believe in the name of God's Own, Jesus Christ, and that we love one another as we were told to do.

24 Those who keep these commandments live in God and God lives in them. We know that God lives in us by the Spirit given to us.

Gospel Reading: john 10:11-18

Jesus is the Good Shepherd in these verses of John 10, the one who lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand runs away when the wolf comes, but the Good Shepherd cares for the sheep and knows them. The Good Shepherd knows there are sheep not of this fold but will bring them together (alluding to Gentiles). In John's account, no one has the power to take Jesus' life—only Jesus has the power to give it up, and Jesus does so by laying down his life for all, so that life may be taken up again.

10 11 I am the good shepherd.

A good shepherd would die for the sheep.

- 12 The hired hand, who is neither shepherd nor owner of the sheep, catches sight of the wolf coming and runs away, leaving the sheep to be scattered or snatched by the wolf.
- 13 That's because the hired hand works only for pay and has no concern for the sheep.
- 14 I am the good shepherd.

I know my sheep

and my sheep know me,

15 in the same way Abba God knows me

and I know God—

and for these sheep

I will lay down my life.

16 I have other sheep

that don't belong to this fold— I must lead them too,

and they will hear my voice.
And then there will be one flock,
one shepherd.
17 This is why Abba God loves me—
because I lay down my life,
only to take it up again.

18 No one takes my life from me;I lay it down freely.I have the power to lay it down,and I have the power to take it up again.This command I received from my Abba."

April is Earth Month

For congregations, it can be a great time to further discern how to best answer our first calling as Christians: the caretaking of God's creation. Form a plan for making the most of April. Check out these suggested activities:

(1) **Celebrate Earth Sunday (April 21st, 2024)!** Many churches celebrate God's creation on the Sunday closest to **Earth Day (April 22nd)**. For this occasion, the UCC partnered with the ecumenical organization **Creation Justice Ministries** to produce an Earth Sunday resource on plastics entitled "*Plastic Jesus: Real Faith in a Synthetic World.*"

Join Creation Justice Ministries and the United Church of Christ in observing Earth Day Sunday with this resource!



Everywhere we look in our culture you will find plastic.

It surrounds our food, it makes up our technology and it is a standard element in our household items. Unfortunately, it is also overflowing from our landfills, floating in our waters and polluting our soil. More and more, you can even find it in our own bodies and those of other living creatures. There have even been traces of plastic found in breast milk. Despite the fact that we have learned the harms of plastics, we are steadily increasing our production of the material and integrating it into more and more items. Plastic is everywhere!

One place where you will not find plastic, however, is in the Bible.

This resource is designed to help congregations think more deeply about the ways that plastics impact our lives and God's creation. It is also intended to equip people of faith to take actions to address this epidemic in faithful and practical ways.

Passover in 2024

This year, Passover starts before sundown on Monday, April 22, and concludes after nightfall on April 30 in the United States. Many Jewish communities will host Seders the first two nights of the holiday.

Passover is later than last year. In 2023, it began at sundown Wednesday, April 5, and ended at sundown Thursday, April 13, according to USA Today.

What is Passover?

Passover is considered the "festival of freedom." It is a celebration of freedom - of God's deliverance of the Jewish people from enslavement in Egypt. The holiday is rooted in the biblical story of Moses and the 10 plagues, which contributed to freeing the Jewish people from Egypt.

The term Passover comes from the Israelites marking the doors of their homes with lamb's blood. This saved their firstborn son from one of the 10 plagues and allowed the angel of death to pass over their house, according to History.com.

How is Passover celebrated?

Jewish people observing Passover will often gather for a Seder, which is the ritual combination of service and dinner.

Some Jewish families or groups will display a Seder plate, the "centerpiece" of Seders that hold symbolic foods marking the holiday. For example, <u>maror</u>, or bitter herbs, represent the bitterness of slavery.

Seders involve moving through a book called a *Haggadah*, which contains stories, prayers, poetry and other teachings.



What food is eaten (or not eaten) during Passover?

Food served during Passover will differ depending on family traditions, according to TIME. Some dishes include matzo ball soup, gefilte fish, beef brisket, chicken and potatoes. *Matzo*, an unleavened bread, is a well-known symbol of Passover.

Many Jews during Passover do not eat certain leavened foods, known as chametz. The dietary changes "reflect the plight of the Israelites as they left Egypt," according to USA Today.

Should I say "Happy Passover" or other greetings?

If you want to greet a friend or loved one who is celebrating Passover, "Happy Passover" is an appropriate sentiment.

You could also say "chaq sameach," which means happy holiday in Hebrew.
